

CHAPTER XVIII

WORLD WAR II

The holocaust of World War I had not yet faded from the memories of Jaffrey people when news flashed over the radios that Germany had invaded Poland on September 1, 1939. Many persons recalled the events that led to our participation in the earlier war and the prospect of another global conflict was a sobering thought.

One year later, with the involvement of the United States in the European conflict still a remote possibility, a group of Jaffrey young men felt the spirit of adventure tugging at their sleeves. With work still scarce after the Great Depression, they talked things over and decided, as a group, to join the New Hampshire National Guard. They enlisted at Keene, New Hampshire, on September 9, 1940, in the Automatic Weapons Battalion, 197th Coast Artillery, and were sent to Concord, New Hampshire. On September 16th the unit was activated into Federal service. It was sent to Camp Hulen in Texas for a year, after which it was transferred to Florida and later to Fort Hamilton, New York City. In February, 1941, it was assigned to Fort Dix, New Jersey. The members of the unit were the first troops to leave the country. At first assigned for service in the Philippines, it landed instead in Australia. The Jaffrey boys in this unit were George A. Sirois, Leonard H. Stewart, Jr., Charles Davis, Robert Blair, Chester MacDonald, and Paul Jalbert who joined the group by induction early in 1941.

Several other young men in Jaffrey enlisted in the regular armed services of the country before the National registration for the draft took place in October, 1940. In the United States Navy was Joseph Coll. Three men, James Ryder, Alfred Kelly (Minkiewicz), and James O'Brien, were in the United States Marines. And in the United States Army were the following Jaffrey men:

The first National Registration of men for the draft in October, 1940, struck a sombre note here with the local youths registering at Union Hall on the 16th. For the second National Registration, July 1, 1941, the Jaffrey men were required to register at the Town House

in Peterborough, New Hampshire. Subsequent registrations were held at the Jaffrey Library Building.

The war's reality became more meaningful in Jaffrey on Monday, February 24, 1941, when nineteen of the town's young men left for Manchester, New Hampshire, for a year's duty with the New Hampshire National Guard. They had enlisted in the 172nd Field Artillery Regiment upon the suggestion of Rev. M. J. Casey, curate at St. Patrick's Church here, and at that time a chaplain in the unit. Upon their arrival in Manchester they were inducted into Federal service. From Manchester some of the men accompanied the motor transport and the rest entrained to arrive together at Camp Blanding, Florida. In this group were the following men:

In 1941 the everyday life of the community became more interrupted and a gradual development of an active and efficient "home front" became the paramount problem of the day, should the United States be drawn into another conflict.

Red Cross bandage classes opened in April, 1941, with the following women in charge of various phases: Nellie R. Evans, Evelyn H. Ruffle, Dorothy Priest, Muriel Vinal, and Thelma Brown. The classes were held at the Jaffrey Grade School Building and the instructors and inspectors were Josephine E. Marcil, Evelyn Ruffle, Edna Reid, Dorothy Burpee, Lucy Gentsch, Grace Colby, Belle White, Anna Gelinis, and Barbara Evans. After working a little over two weeks, four thousand dressings were completed. In June the women were called upon to make 21,000 small sponges. When the classes closed in November, 1941, 44,300 surgical dressings had been completed.

On November 1, 1941, a Home Nursing course was opened under the Red Cross in charge of Grace Colby, Red Cross nurse. She was assisted by the following registered nurses: Dorothy Burpee Cham-

berlain, Lilla Greene, Emma Lambert, Rita Deschenes, and Helen Towne. This was a five week course at the grade school building.

Early in October Governor Robert O. Blood appointed Philip M. Darling and Ruth P. Chouinard to head a committee for a local Defense Council to organize groups for various kinds of work, with special attention given to protection from air raids. The other members of the Council were the selectmen, Jason C. Sawyer, Ralph E. Boynton, and Ovila J. Belletete, Fire Chief Philip C. Tremblay, Police Chief Hubert F. O'Neil, and the Public Safety chairman, Alfred G. Cournoyer. The Council held their first meeting on October 8 at Fireman's Hall. While this meeting was only two months before the attack by Japan on Pearl Harbor and the subsequent declaration of war against the United States by Germany, it gave Jaffrey an opportunity and time to organize an effective working program.

During the summer of 1941, in answer to the National call for aluminum for salvage, a house-to-house aluminum collection was conducted under the direction of the selectmen, assisted by Paul A. Leach, Alphe Lamothe, and Leon W. Priest, and the Jaffrey Boy Scout Troop. The Jaffrey collection netted five hundred pounds of the metal. The response to the drive in Jaffrey was wholehearted. One housewife emptied her aluminum coffee pot and reached for a new one from the cupboard and handed them to the salvage collector.

A gasoline shortage was feared and toward its saving the local factories adjusted their hours of employment to make greater conservation of the fuel possible.

Following the attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, and the actual state of war, "home front" activities were accelerated. On Monday and Tuesday evenings, December 15 and 16, air raid defense schools were held. In January, 1942, an air raid warning system was inaugurated with John T. Conrad as chief air raid warden. The control center was at Fireman's Hall, with a 24-hour service for telephone at the center. Airplane observation posts were set up, Observation Post 11-B at East Rindge, New Hampshire, serving also the Jaffrey area. On February 8 this post was moved to the hill on the Fred W. Moore farm (now the Robert Schulze farm) and designated as Observation Post C-22 Jaffrey. That month, too, the town was divided into 27 sectors for protection against enemy air raids. Observers were stationed at various vantage points. By

October the posts were manned by 122 observers on three-hour shifts each.

On Friday evening, April 17, 1942, the first test blackout, county-wide, was held from 9:30 to 9:50. An airplane flew over the area at 1500 feet altitude to observe its effectiveness. The test was a success and gave the people of Jaffrey a solemn feeling as to what the future could bring. Other tests followed from time to time, and all of them proved successful in Jaffrey. In this initial test, however, Jaffrey received some nation-wide publicity. Jaffrey's octogenarian bellringer, Charles S. Phelps, then nearly blind, hurried from his Jaffrey Center home across the Common to ring the bell in the Old Meetinghouse steeple. The story was picked up by the Associated Press and for some time afterward, Phelps received press clippings from all over the country.

In July, 1942, the Cheshire County Rationing Board opened a branch office in Jaffrey at the Red Cross Center. This was manned by members of the Jaffrey Civic Club. In November, 1942, the local Rationing Board was moved to a room in the Dillon Block. John T. Conrad was named in charge of the office and was assisted by Charles Letourneau and James Lane.

It was proved again during World War II that Jaffrey is an extraordinary town. Whatever wartime restrictions were imposed upon its citizens were accepted in the cause of a war to be won, without grumbling, for grumbling never won wars. Federal tire rationing regulations became effective on Monday, January 5, 1942, which limited eligibility to the most essential services. Registration for sugar rationing was held in early May, followed by that for gasoline rationing a week later. When in November the Federal Government announced its plan to keep automobiles in use for essential driving by the purchase of idle tires, the people of Jaffrey scurried about collecting any extra tires they had. They were advised to retain their five best tires and sell the others to the Government. The extra tires were delivered to the American Railway Express Agency office without cost to the people and delivered to the Government warehouses.

Registration for fuel oil and range oil took place at the end of October and by the end of the year the situation became so critical that homeowners were requested to convert to coal. This was in the face of the coldest winter in sixty-eight years.

Many food items were in shorter supply and War Ration Books began to be issued, the second of these in March, 1943, when 2,593

copies were issued here. Ration Book No. 3 was mailed from the mailing center in Concord, New Hampshire, but Ration Book No. 4 was issued in October, 1943, at the Jaffrey Grade School. Classes were dismissed at 12:15 P.M., on the 25th, 26th, and 27th, to give Principal Clayton Craig and the teachers time to distribute the books. As new books were issued, the old ones had to be returned. For coffee lovers "ersatz" coffee appeared on the store shelves and many tried it without much satisfaction.

Early in the spring of 1942 Jaffrey citizens were advised to plant Victory Gardens to raise some of their food. The idea took hold and gardens sprung up everywhere and were continued annually to the war's end. The Jaffrey Outing Club offered the use of the so-called Carey farm for Victory Gardens and the long abandoned acres of the farm bloomed again with growing vegetables. Land was also made available by D. D. Bean. Early that spring Charles H. Frost was named to assist the people with their garden problems. No better choice could have been made. At that time he was horticulturist and gardener on the summer estate of Graham B. Blaine at Jaffrey Center, and came from a long line of gardeners in England. He was apprenticed early in life to a head gardener on a large mansion estate, like those in Daphne du Maurier's novels. Later he attended Edinburgh University. He was working in the wheatfields of Canada at the outbreak of World War I and returned to England to fight in the cavalry. After the war he migrated to America. He came to Jaffrey in the early 1940's. Under his guidance, trial and error methods in gardening, even by amateurs, were eliminated and the bounty of Victory Gardens resulted in renewed home canning activity. Housewives were assisted in their canning projects by members of the Jaffrey Grange.

War Bond loans, USO (United Service Organization) drives, and Red Cross quotas were familiar themes and the responses to them were gratifying. The second USO drive was in June, 1942, under the chairmanship of Ferdinand Gordon with a quota of \$1,000.00. On August 29, 1942, Silver Ranch held a horse show, with fifty entries, for the benefit of the USO, netting \$200.00. Jaffrey people responded generously as already two hundred of the town's young men and women were in the fighting forces. The third War Loan opened September 9, 1943, with a quota of \$450,000.00, almost twice the previous one. The fourth War Loan, which was held in 1944, was oversubscribed by nearly fifty per cent. The Red Cross quota of

March, 1944, was likewise oversubscribed. Whatever the wartime project was, Jaffrey went all the way in an all-out effort.

The Machinery Dealers Association of New England had started scrap metal salvage drives of their own, with depots at the respective dealer-member premises. In Jaffrey this depot was on the yard of its salvage chairman, Don A. Eaves, where farm scrap and other metal were collected. From his yard alone about thirty-seven tons of scrap metal went out. Illness forced his resignation and in September, 1942, he was succeeded by Henry J. Belletete. At that time the need for scrap metal of all kinds was very urgent and the Jaffrey drive got underway in early October. The depot was on the site of the present Town Office Building. By October 30th over a hundred tons of scrap metal had been collected. It was sold at five dollars a ton to buyers in Manchester, New Hampshire, and Gardner, Massachusetts, and the proceeds were given to the Red Cross and the USO. The students at Conant High School conducted a scrap metal drive of their own on Saturdays during 1941 and 1942. Their depot was on the school grounds adjacent to the Pomponio property. Having neither automobiles nor gasoline, their collections were dragged by hand, some of it with considerable difficulty, but the result of their volunteer efforts was a huge pile of metal.

In May, 1942, Joan M. Brandt-Erichsen, chairman of the Bundles for America, initiated locally this home service project to provide reading matter, games, etc., for the boys in the service, especially those in the United States Navy, and clothing for families of service men anywhere in America. The Jaffrey Public Library served as headquarters. The ripping and sewing of old garments donated for the purpose were done in a room in the Dillon Block. Abbie A. Day and Emma Webster were in charge of the ripping and sewing. Co-chairmen were Doris Austin, Ruth Smith, Kate Hamill, and Mattie Jackson. Llewellyn LaPage had charge of the magazine and book collections. The first shipment to the New England headquarters in Boston was made in August and included over 300 garments, 318 magazines, and 81 books. Marion G. Symonds served as treasurer and Georgia Eaves as secretary.

When formal membership requirements and dues were pressed by the head Bundles for America organization, the Jaffrey workers demonstrated that Jaffrey does things in her own way. Bundles for America were discontinued and "Bundles from Jaffrey" or kit bags, as they were also called, were substituted. These were made of heavy duck or denim and lettered "Bundles from Jaffrey" on the front.

They were filled with small items like toothpaste and the like and sent to APO addresses of Jaffrey men in the fighting forces.

That same month the Jaffrey Red Cross Chapter received a request for 7,500 dressings for defense stations in New Hampshire. These were completed in record time. Afternoon classes were in charge of Evelyn Ruffle, chairman, Edna Reid, and Ella Griffiths. Mary McInnis, Eleanor Blanchette, and Marie Letourneau had charge of the evening classes.

The grimness of the times became more real in December, 1942, when, for the first time, the Christmas tree on Library lawn was eliminated from the holiday observance due to war rules. A letter from the War Production Board in Washington, D. C., requested the elimination of all outdoor lighting, and for everyone it was a dark Christmas.

The people of Jaffrey took their wartime responsibilities seriously and cooperated fully with the State and National programs. Of prime concern were civilian defense, evacuees and evacuation, and the care of refugees in case the coastal areas were attacked. Alice La-Page, chairman of the Red Cross Clothing Committee, reported in September, 1942, that nearly 3,000 pairs of shoes were in stock in Jaffrey stores and that there was an ample supply of clothing for evacuees if needed. Her committee was charged with the responsibility of supplying clothing for victims of any catastrophe. Jaffrey was in position to feed and clothe 435 refugees, if necessary. The inventory of stocks in stores included 605 pairs of overshoes, 1,037 pairs of rubbers, 4,196 pairs of stockings, 1,325 suits of underwear, 2,186 pair of trousers, and 750 dresses.

Jaffrey held its first Civilian Defense meeting on Wednesday, September 23, 1942, with a large turnout at Union Hall. Chairman Philip M. Darling introduced the Cheshire County Civilian Defense chairman, Edward Russell of Troy, New Hampshire, who expressed his pleasure at the progress made in Jaffrey. County Agent C. J. Ahern voiced his amazement at the splendid work and spirit shown here, adding that Jaffrey not only was at the head in town organization county-wise but also held a leading place in the entire state.

Prescott Duncan replaced Rev. Willard S. Smith, who had gone into the service, as evacuee and evacuation chairman. He named the following committees: John T. Conrad, survey; Louis Duval, rescue; Carl A. Butler, transportation; Sarah Griswold, food; Doris Austin, canteen; Edward L. Fay, purchase supplies; and William B. Winslow, funds and publicity.

The East Jaffrey Branch of the Red Cross started training its own Women's Motor Corps in September, 1941, under the direction of Carl Boutwell. The following women were original members: Margaret Bunce, Elsie Lynaugh, Ellen Smith, Mattie Jackson, Dorothy Priest, Anne Gordon, Phyllis Sawyer, Nancy Sawyer, and Lena Boudrieau. The chief services of the Corps were the transportation of people to the Peterborough Hospital in case of need and the rendering of first aid. It also went on trips on convoys. It was captained by Margaret Bunce, with Elsie Lynaugh, who later joined the Women's Marine Corps, Marguerite Morin, who later joined the Women's Army Corps, and Ellen Smith was closely associated with her. In all there were about twenty women in the corps, including two from Rindge.

Standard first aid courses were resumed on January 6, 1943, under the instruction of Phyllis Sawyer. Co-chairman Lucy Slade announced at this time that Jaffrey had 150 persons who held First Aid Certificates, over 50 with Advanced Certificates, and over 200 who had taken the ten-hour course required by the State.

On April 5th a public defense meeting was held at Union Hall under the direction of Joseph F. Walsh, Sub-District Director of the First Fighter Command, with the Contact Squad of the United States Army, from the First Fighter Command, A.W.S., present. All townspeople, heads and members of defense groups, and observers were invited to attend. The invitation was also extended to residents of Rindge, Fitzwilliam and Troy, New Hampshire.

Two days later a meeting was held in Library Hall with the Home Food Production chairman, Charles H. Frost, present for the discussion of the problem of food production. The most important needs of other committees received attention likewise at this meeting. On April 11, all observers registered for Aircraft Recognition School.

Surgical dressings classes continued to function and by mid December about fifty workers had completed an 11,000 quota, with a new quota to arrive.

The "home front" activities were continued through 1944 and until the end of the war in 1945. In this chapter have been told some of the highlights, but many others remain untold. Jaffrey's contribution to the winning of the war, both on the battlefield and on the "home front", was significant.

By the end of the war there were 504 Jaffrey men and women in the armed forces. The Honor Roll of their names was dedicated at

the Memorial Day exercises in May, 1945. Charles M. Mills gave the oration, with the State's newly adopted motto, "Live Free or Die," as his theme.

Following President Harry S. Truman's Proclamation of Victory in Europe Day, May 8, 1945, for most of the people in Jaffrey it was "work as usual", with special services in the churches the following Sunday. There was no special celebration because there was another war front in the Pacific where many Jaffrey men were still fighting in the cause of freedom.

V-J Day, August 14, 1945, was received here with much acclaim, with wild cheering, milling throngs, whistles blowing at the factories, and church bells ringing. An impromptu parade was held in the village and services of thanksgiving in all the churches. At Jaffrey Center, however, a more solemn note was struck, with one of the largest crowds in many years gathered at the meetinghouse to sing hymns and offer prayers of thanksgiving. The bell in its steeple was rung again by Charles S. Phelps, for him for the last time.

While throughout the war the people of Jaffrey had cheerfully and with enthusiasm done their share on the home front, there was a sigh of relief everywhere when the war finally ended. No more was there a dread of an announcement of a casualty overseas, but, instead, an eager awaiting for their boys to return home. Gasolineless days, restricted automobile driving, sugarless meals, and all rationing became things of the past as the people gradually resumed their normal mode of living. There was a note of sadness, however, as many of the boys would not be returning home. They had given their last full measure. Subsequently, the bodies of many of them were brought back for burial in the family lots.

The following Jaffrey boys died in World War II:

EDWARD WELL ALLORD, husband of Priscilla M. (Baird) Allord and son of Edward J. and Katherine L. (Grey) Allord, was killed in action in Germany on March 17, 1945. He was born in Northampton, Massachusetts, on March 29, 1915, and came to Jaffrey in 1933 as a member of the Civilian Conservation Corps at Camp Annett. He is buried in Belgium.

DONALD EDWARD BROOKS died of diphtheria in France on April 12, 1945. He was the son of Andrew and Hilma (Ruuspakka) Brooks of Jaffrey and was born here on April 4, 1925. His body was brought back to Jaffrey for burial in the family lot in Conant Cemetery.

ADELARD G. CARON, husband of Emelda (Vachon) Caron, was killed in the Battle of the Bulge on December 14, 1944. He was born in St. Jean Port Joli, County L'Islet, P. Q., Canada, in 1907, the son of Abraham and Josephine (Jean) Caron. He came to Jaffrey with his father's family in 1915. His body was returned to Jaffrey and buried in St. Patrick's Cemetery.

ERIK HARRY HAMILTON was killed in action in World War II near Florence, Italy, on April 15, 1945. He was a native of Trollhattan, Sweden, born May 18, 1919, the eldest child of Axel H. and Anna (Johanson) Hamilton, later of Jaffrey. His body was brought back for burial in Conant Cemetery.

CLIFTON A. HURD, husband of Arline (Bourgeois) Hurd of Jaffrey, was the son of Henry A. and Vinnie M. (Jackson) Hurd of Sharon, New Hampshire. He died on June 14, 1944, from wounds received in action June 7, 1944, in the Normandy Invasion in France. His body was returned to Jaffrey and buried in Conant Cemetery.

RAYMOND SAMUEL LAFRENIERE, who enlisted in the United States Marines in 1942, was killed in action on Iwo Jima on March 3, 1943. He was born in Jaffrey on October 16, 1925, the son of Samuel and Beatrice J. (Bosley) LaFreniere. His body was brought back to Jaffrey for burial in St. Patrick's Cemetery.

EDWARD MORRIS, son of Louis Morris of Jaffrey, died in World War II. Details are unavailable.

RICHARD DONALD PATTERSON, enlisted in the U. S. Navy while still a student at Conant High School at the age of 17. He was the son of George and Eva (Poulin) Patterson of Jaffrey. He was killed in action on October 30, 1944, on board the U. S. S. Aircraft Carrier *Franklin* in the Philippines when an enemy suicide plane came down killing five men on the ship. He was buried at sea. He was awarded the Purple Heart, several other medals and citations, including the Presidential Citation.

ARTHUR G. SIROIS, husband of the former Dorothy Brown of South Carolina, and son of Felix and Florina (Dubois) Sirois of Jaffrey, was killed accidentally in France in World War II on September 16, 1944. He was born in Jaffrey, February 28, 1916, and enlisted in the New Hampshire National Guard in 1940 or

1941. In June, 1941, other Jaffrey boys, who had been at Camp Blanding since February, saw him at Camp Blanding.

A project probably not found anywhere else in the country was carried on during the war by Wilfred Varville, whose son, Patrick, was among the second group of New Hampshire Guard enlistees from Jaffrey. As the Jaffrey men and women went into the service, he obtained their photographs and devoted a corner of his living room as a niche where these pictures were on display until some time after the war. His home on Pine Street became a mecca for thousands of visitors, under whose footsteps his living room rug wore out. They will be given to the Historical Society.

The military service records of the individual Jaffrey men who served in World War I were obtained for Volume I of THE HISTORY OF JAFFREY from the office of the Adjutant General in Concord, New Hampshire. The service records of the men and women who served in World War II are not available. To obtain them individually was found to be an impossible task. Many of the men credited to Jaffrey have left town and their present whereabouts are unknown.
