Journeys of J. Mackintosh Bell since 1921.

- 1921 South-west shore, south of Pine Point, examining lead and zinc
GREAT SLAVE LAKE. deposits, which were reached from Peace River Crossing by descending the Peace and Slave rivers.
- 1922 Same locality as 1921, near Pine Point, and later travelled
GREAT SLAVE LAKE. through les Iles au Large to Gros Cap on North-east shore and up the North West Arm to the mouth of the Yellowknife River.
- 1928
GREAT SLAVE LAKE. Same two localities as in the summer of 1922

- 1930

- 1928 Northern Manitoba. A trip along the Hudson's Bay railway as far
as the crossing of the Nelson River. Short canoe journeys were
made also around Wintering Lake near mileage 185, and from
Cranberry Portage to the locality now known as the Sherritt-Gordon
Mine.
- 1928 - 1929 Northern British Columbia. Short trips on and around
Hudson's Bay Mountain near Smithers, B. C.
- 1930 Albania. Trips by motor Durazzo to Tirana, Durazzo to Scutari,
and thence to Ragusa in Yugo-Slavia.
1931. Journey across Trans-Siberian Railway from Moscow to Manchouli,
and thence by way of Harbin to Dairen and Shanghai. From Shanghai
by way of Nanking, Peking, and Tientsin back to Dairen and Mukden.
Between the two last named places two days were spent at Anshan
and Tankangtse and from Mukden a side trip was made to the
Fushun Mine.

Dear Coolidge:

A note in reply to your circular asking for information about my travels since 1925: I sailed from San Francisco in 1926 for Sydney, Australia, via Honolulu, Pango Pango, and Fiji. After a month or so in Sydney I sailed northward from there to the Torres Straits Islands. From there I went to Port Darwin on the northwestern coast of Australia. From there I took a lugger and went out to the Crocodile Islands, which lie off the coast of North Australia at longitude 135° , latitude 12° , then went into Arnhem Land, which is the interior part, south of the islands, returned to the Crocodiles, took a dugout canoe trip along the coast to Elcho Island, Buckingham Bay, the English Company Islands, Arnhem Bay, and then into the interior from there. After my return to Darwin I went back to Sydney, covered the southern part of Australia, and once more sailed from Sydney to Port Darwin. From Port Darwin I went down to the Never Never country (the Mataranka) and the Roper River, which is about longitude 134° , latitude 15° . I once again went to the Crocodile Islands and into Arnhem Land before returning to Sydney and ultimately to San Francisco and Boston.

I have followed your directions in this and have included "the names of well-known places" I have visited as well as the areas which have only infrequently been visited by white men or not at all. I hope this meets your need.

In July and August, 1925, I visited England and France, spending most of the time in and about Paris and London.

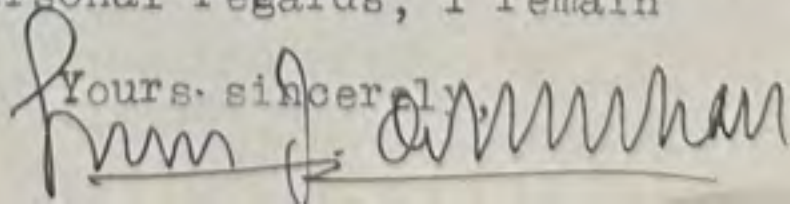

Dear Sirs:

In answer to your request, the following are the trips that I have taken since January, 1925:

In the Summer of 1925, five of us sailed for Rotterdam, hired a yacht and cruised up the Rhine as far as Nijmegen, motored through the Hinderland and then sailed up the IJssel, crossed the Zuider Zee stopping at Urk, then to Hoorn, Amsterdam, Marken, and Alkmaar, through the canals to The Hague, Delft to Rotterdam, Dordrecht and then to Middelburg and the other islands off the coast, then by airplane from Rotterdam to London, motoring through the small towns on the Cornish Coast up to Liverpool.

In 1926, I went to Jamaica and motored all over the Island.

In 1927, I went through Yugoslavia, Montenegro and Herzegovina then to Venice, through the Dolomites, Lake Garda, Verona, Bologna, Ravenna, Rimini, Florence, along the Riviera to Genoa.

In the Spring of 1928, I landed at Algiers, motored through Algeria to Tunisia, going up the Karawan, through Sicily, Southern Italy as far as Rome.

In 1929, I went out through the Big Horn Mountains in Wyoming, drove a Ford car to Jackson Hole, Yellowstone Park, over the Big Horn Mountains back to Boston.

In 1930, I went out to Santa Fe, drove a Ford car 2500 miles through Arizona and New Mexico, and the Indian Pueblos.

In 1931 I landed in Morocco, got a Ford car and drove south as far as Marrakesh; went over the Atlas Mountains, - Asni, Telouet, then back up through Riff country coming out at Tetuan and Ceuta, crossing to Spain; drove a Ford car the entire length of Spain going to France over the Pyrenees; then up through to Paris and London, - 4000 miles.

If there is any further information you wish regarding these trips I shall be glad to furnish it. I also have road maps covering all of these trips, which, of course, are always at the service of the Club.

Gentlemen:

In response to your recent letter I am sending a list of the places I visited between 1925 and December 1931. As you suggested I have included many more details than you probably need.

1925 - Alaska

Seattle, Seward, Fairbanks, return to Seward; trip from Kenai Lake, down Kenai River to Skilak Lake; hunted throughout country within 25 mile radius ~~west~~ ^{south} and ~~south~~ ^{southwest} of Skilak Lake.

1926 - Alaska.

Seattle to Juneau; by gas boat into Taku Inlet then to Glacier Bay, then up the coast to Lituya Bay. Down west side of Chichagof Island to Salisbury Sound, then through Peril Strait, to Chatham Strait then around southern tip of Admiralty Island and up Frederick Sound to Stephen's Passage and Juneau.

1927 - Alaska.

Seattle to Ketchikan then due west to Squaw Harbor in Shumagin Islands. Then to King Cove to False Pass up into Bering Sea to point northwest of Mt. Pavlof. Hunting throughout region to the north and west of Mt. Pavlof. Return by same route.

Later in season.

Seattle to Cordova up Copper River to Chitina then to Fairbanks, then to McKinley Park Station. Then by pack train ^{WESTWARD} along north side of Alaska Range to Mt. Dall and the Tonzona River. Return to Mt. McKinley Park Station and then south to Anchorage. By airplane from Anchorage to Tustamena Lake on Kenai Peninsula. Hunting throughout district to the north and east of Tustamena Lake. Return down Kasilof River to Cook Inlet and then up to Anchorage, thence to Seward and return.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH OF DR. JULIUS KLEIN,
ASSISTANT SECRETARY OF COMMERCE.

Dr. Julius Klein, Assistant Secretary of Commerce, was born in San Jose, California, on June 27, 1886.

He was graduated from the University of California in 1907, taking there his bachelor's and master's degrees. Later, he won his Ph. D. at Harvard with a thesis on Spanish economic history.

Dr. Klein studied in Europe at the University of Berlin, and at the Sorbonne in Paris. He traveled extensively in Europe and Latin America making special investigations on historical and economic subjects.

From 1915 to 1917, he was Instructor at Harvard in Latin American History and Economics, and later, from 1920 to 1921, he was Assistant Professor in these subjects. His course at Harvard included lectures on the materials of Latin American trade.

In 1917, Secretary Redfield made Dr. Klein Chief of the Latin American Division of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce to supervise the preparation of various Latin American economic data connected with the War.

In April, 1919, Dr. Klein was appointed Commercial Attache at Buenos Aires, remaining in the Argentine capital until the summer of the following year. He rejoined the faculty of Harvard in 1920. In March of the next year, when Mr. Hoover was made Secretary of Commerce, Dr. Klein was summoned to be Director of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, and served in that position until appointed by President Hoover on April 30, 1929, to be Assistant Secretary of Commerce.

During recent years Dr. Klein has visited European trade centers making investigations of economic conditions affecting American commerce. On each of these visits he has held conferences with the United States Commercial Attaches in Europe. In 1927, he was one of the official American Delegates to the International Economic Conference at Geneva.

Dear Mr. Coolidge,

I have the notice of the Harvard Travellers Club which you signed and reply herewith,

On March 21st 1929 I took ship at Marseilles for Tamatave, Madagascar. The ship touched during the passage at Port Said, Suez, Djibouti, Mombassa, Zanzibar, Dar-Es-Salaam, in Africa; Grand Comoro; Majanga, Diego Suarez and Tamatave in Madagascar.

While on the island I made a trip into the south east by way on Ambalavao, Fianarantsoa and Ihosy to Farafangana on the coast.

In August 1929 I embarked from Tamatave and returned by the same route as far as Djibouti, French Somali Land. There I went ashore for two weeks and made a trip into Abyssinia as far as the city of Harar. Returning to Djibouti, I re-embarked for Saigon, French Indo China. At Colombo, Ceylon, I stopped for two weeks and travelled into the interior jungles near Koslanda. Continuing the journey, to Saigon, I re-shipped for Tourane. From Tourane I went to Hue, capital of Annam, and later to Hanoi, capital of Tonkin. From there I went to Chapa, near Lao-Kay on the border of Tonkin and Yunnan where I remained for nearly two months. Returning to Hanoi and later Haiphong, I made a two weeks cruise among the islands of

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the Bai d'Along.

After a flying visit to Canton via Hong Kong,
I returned to Indo China and travelled south ~~to~~
over the well advertised Mandarine Road to
visit the ruins ~~and~~ at Angkor after which I
returned to Saigon and eventually Marseilles.

I hope this is the reply that you
wanted.
