DEBORAH HOARD - "THEY CALL IT MYANMAR: LIFTING THE CURTAIN"

This is an evocative documentary film about what was until recently one of the most isolated societies on earth. Shot clandestinely over a 2-year period, we get a look at the everyday life of the people who were held hostage by a brutal military regime for 48 years. This unique documentary culled from over 120 hours of striking images, is an impressionistic journey. Interviews and interactions with more than 100 people throughout Burma, including an interview with the recently released Aung San Suu Kyi, are interwoven with spectacular footage of the little seen nation and its people.

The film was called "a thing of beauty...a documentary with all the virtues of a great feature film." and named one of the top 12 documentaries of 2012 by Roger Ebert.

Deborah C. Hoard has been a producer, researcher and writer at PhotoSynthesis, in Ithaca, NY, for 25 years, and president since 2003. Her work in film and video is focused on education and social justice, and has won more than 100 international and national media awards. She produced THEY CALL IT MYANMAR together with filmmaker and Cornell physics teacher Robert H. Lieberman. Deborah will show excerpts of the film and talk about the challenges of producing it.

Serum Run'25...The Great Race against Death

Dr. Jerry Vanek

In 1925, the threat of a fatal, devastating diphtheria epidemic threatened Nome, Alaska, an icebound city home to hundreds of immunologically naïve Alaskan Eskimos. Twenty Alaskan dog mushers, mail carriers, and trappers formed a relay of volunteers to carry life-saving diphtheria antitoxin across 650 miles of Alaskan wilderness through blizzard conditions in temperatures plummeting to minus sixty degrees. Americans from coast to coast followed the 5-day "Race against Death" with breathless anticipation, and the event and its successful conclusion altered the American postal system, aviation, public health delivery, and journalism forever.

Over 70 years later, in 1997, Harvard alum Colonel Norman Vaughan inaugurated the annual Serum Run '25 reenactment relay across Alaska from Nenana to Nome. Every year, between 15 and 30 dog mushers and snow machine support personnel assume the identities of the original 20 Serum Runners and carry the ceremonial diphtheria serum along the original route. In conditions often

remarkably reminiscent with temperatures hovering around minus fifty, the modern SR '25 reenactment pursues somewhat different goals: To honor the memory of the original heroes; to spread modern public health messages promoting early childhood vaccinations, drug and alcohol avoidance, suicide prevention, etc.; and to celebrate indigenous Native cultures which endure in the Alaskan bush today.

For the past quarter century, veterinarian Dr. Jerry Vanek has traveled the world working with sled dogs. From South Africa to Norway to Chile to Alaska he has served as an official veterinarian on some 100 races and expeditions and presented over 160 lectures on sled dog medicine to professionals and the public—work for which he stands alone and holds multiple honors. In 1993, he joined Colonel Vaughan on the latter's historic Mount Vaughan Antarctic Expedition, then rejoined Vaughan in 1997 for the first reenactment of the 1925 Serum Run. Jerry returned to the Serum Run '25 in 2007, '09, and '11. Dr. Vanek makes his home on his grandfather's 1881 homestead in Minnesota's northern Red River Valley and at his retreat with partner Jill on the shores of Gitchigami in Minnesota's Arrowhead.

FREDDIE WILKINSON - "MOUNTAIN/STORY"

Freddie Wilkinson believes that any mountain adventure is only as valuable as the stories brought home. With intimate book readings and jaw-dropping mountain cinematography, Mountain/Story weaves tales of Wilkinson's own climbing exploits. His captivating multi-media presentation reveals his thought-provoking and wholly original perspective on the freedom of the hills and those that have inspired him.

Wilkinson grew up in the flatlands of suburban Connecticut and climbed his first mountain -New Hampshire's Mount Washington - at age thirteen. By age 20, Wilkinson had climbed Denali via the Cassin Ridge and Nepal's Cholatse via the West Rib. Since then, he has spent three to four months of every year on expeditions around the globe. In between traveling, Wilkinson earned a degree in history from Dartmouth College and worked as a climbing guide in New England and Alaska. In 2007, Wilkinson established new routes on three different mountains on three different continents: Patagonia's Cerro Poincinot, The Fin in Alaska, and Mount Mahindra in the Indian Himalaya. That's pretty good - but Wilkinson still considers himself to be better at telling stories than he is a climbing mountains.

In August 2010, Freddie published his first book, "One Mountain Thousand Summits: The Untold Story of Tragedy and True Heroism on K2". An insider's account of one of the deadliest and most controversial tragedies in mountaineering history-the 2008 K2 disaster.

Afghanistan The Glory of Mes Aynak: Past Magnificance, Future Threats Dr. Joseph Schuldenrein

Aynak and how is Afghanistan's magnificent heritage threatened in a turbulent world?

The ancient site of Mes Aynak, Afghanistan, was one of the pivotal stations along the famed Silk Road connecting the Far East to Europe. The site was the location of some of the earliest and richest Bronze Age mines. Subsequently it functioned as a major site of the Buddhist era with magnificent sculptures and a series of monasteries housing some of the world's richest ceremonial structures. The site is in danger of destruction because of the emergence of a renewed copper mining industry. This presentation tracks the evolution of Mes Aynak through its age of florescence and abandonment and also examines the very real threats to its preservation in a developing Afghanistan.

Close Encounters of the Wild Kind

Adventures at the Top of the Food Chain

John King

Explorer, photographer, author, and Cape Cod conservationist John King will share insights into his personal voyage of re-discovery during expeditions into the wild in the earth's most remote places. During this presentation, you will hear John's stories and see photographs of unique encounters with white sharks, whales and his now famous extraordinary encounter with mountain gorillas as seen by millions and featured on ABC's Good Morning America..

John is an entrepreneur with a diverse resume, who has strong ties to Cape Cod that span many generations. After finishing college, John spent more than 7 years working as a commercial fisherman on vessels in Alaska. He became a licensed ship's Master at the age of 27 and skippered the 180 foot crabber, Baranof, operating in the Bering Sea during the "hey day" of the king crab fishery. After helping to raise a family and managing a subsequent, successful career in the biopharmaceutical world that spanned 26 years, John relocated back to his roots in Chatham and has been active in various pursuits working to make a difference in the community. Among other responsibilities, John is the co-founder of The Common Flat Project, a Cape Cod based conservation organization, a Board member of the Center for Coastal Studies as well as a Board member of the recently formed Atlantic White Shark Conservancy. John also serves as the Chairman of the Board of

Trustees for the Chatham Historical Society and its Atwood House Museum.

In recent years John, together with his wife Pam, have been pursuing a lifelong passion to experience and record the earth's wild places and wild things through their photography. Their first book entitled: Wild Cape Cod, Free by Nature is available from many local booksellers and through Schiffer Publishing.
