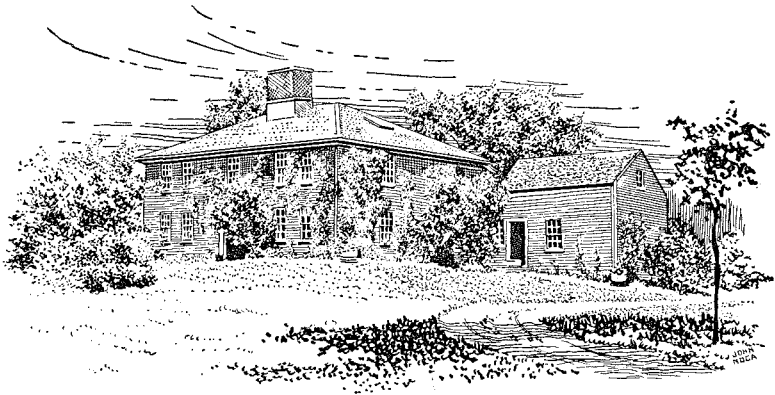


GARFIELD



OLD GARFIELD HOMESTEAD, LINCOLN, MASS.

The Garfields of Jaffrey are of an old English family whose lineage may be traced for several generations beyond the sea. The immigrant ancestor of the American families was EDWARD¹ GARFIELD of Watertown, Mass., who d. in 1672, at the age of 97.

EDWARD², was admitted a freeman in 1635 and served as selectman in 1638, 1655, and 1662. He m. Rebecca, surname unknown, and the children named in his will were, Samuel, Joseph, Benjamin, Rebecca and Abigail.

CAPT. BENJAMIN³, b. 1643; d. Nov. 28, 1717; was a noted man and held all the principal town offices; was representative for nine terms. He m. (1) Mehitabel Hawkins, who d. Sept. 9, 1675; m. (2) 1678, Elizabeth, dau. of Matthew Bridge. Children: (1) Benjamin. (2) Benoni. (3) Elizabeth. (4) *Thomas*. (Forward.) (5) Anne. (6) Mehitabel. (7) Samuel. (8) John. His second wife outlived him and m. (2) 1720, Daniel Harrington of Lexington, Mass. His slate gravestone, still to be seen in the old Waltham Burying Ground, bears the inscription:

"Here Lyes Buried the
Body of Capt. Benjamin
Garfield Aget 74 year
Who departed This Life
November the 28, 1717."

Lt. THOMAS⁴, b. Dec. 12, 1680; lived in that part of Weston which was incorporated in 1754 as Lincoln. His fine old Colonial Mansion may still be seen about one mile directly south of Lincoln Center. He d. Feb. 4, 1752. He m. Jan. 2, 1706/7, Mercy Bigelow of Watertown. Twelve children.

THOMAS⁵, also a lieutenant, was bp. in Lincoln, Mass., at five years old, Apr. 5, 1713; m. Oct. 21, 1742, Rebecca Johnson of Lunenburg, Mass. He was selectman and town treasurer, and d. in Lincoln, Jan. 3, 1774. Children: (1) Solomon. (2) Rebecca. (3) Abraham. (Forward.) (4) Lucy. ABRAHAM⁶, b. Apr. 3, 1748;

d. Aug. 15, 1775, a. 27. He participated in the fight at Concord Bridge, and signed an affidavit as to circumstances attending that event. SOLOMON⁶, b. 1743; d. 1807, from a fall in his barn. He m. Lucy Brown and had five children. THOMAS⁷, his eldest son, m. Asenath Hill of Schoharie County, N. Y., and had four children. ABRAHAM⁸, b. 1799; d. Orange, Cayuga County, Ohio, May 3, 1833; m. Eliza Ballou, b. Richmond, N. H., Sept. 21, 1801. They were the parents of President James A. Garfield.

JOHN⁸, son of Lt. Thomas⁴, b. Dec. 3, 1718; m. 1744/5, Thankful Stowell. He d. May, 1767.

JOHN⁶, b. Weston, 1751, was a soldier of the Revolution and was engaged in the Concord fight, when, according to tradition, he received a bullet hole in his leather shoe-maker's apron which he wore into the fray. He served in the army through the Revolution. In 1792 he removed to that part of Marlborough, N. H., afterward Troy, with his wife and nine children, where he bought a farm and spent the remainder of his life. Two of his children lived in Jaffrey, and three others married into Jaffrey families. He was buried in a cemetery in Marlborough near one of the gates in an unmarked grave. He m. Lucy Smith, and had fourteen children:

1. ABRAHAM⁷ GARFIELD (John⁶, John⁵, Thomas⁴, Benjamin³, Edward², Edward¹), b. 1779; m. in Marlborough, N. H., Oct. 6, 1805, Eunice Thurston, b. June 25, 1780, dau. of David and Eunice (Whitney) Thurston, who were settlers in the almost unbroken wilderness in Marlborough, as early as 1775. Her grandfather, Benjamin Thurston, lived in Newbury and Rowley, Mass., the cradle of so many of the pioneer families of Jaffrey, and m. Sarah Burpee, dau. of Thomas and Hester (Hopkinson) Burpee of Rowley. Ties of kinship are also found between the Thurston family and the Jewetts, Spoffords, Chadwicks, Woodburys, Perkinses and Baileys, all Jaffrey families originating in Rowley and surrounding towns. Abraham and Eunice (Thurston) Garfield lived first in that part of Marlborough afterward incorporated as Troy, where four of the children were born. They removed about 1813 to Landgrove, Vt., where she d. Feb. 23, 1841.

(5) JOHN⁸ GARFIELD (Abraham⁷, John⁶, John⁵, John⁴, Capt. Benjamin³, Edward², Edward¹), b. Feb. 27, 1812, in Troy; came to Jaffrey at sixteen years of age to work for Moses Perkins. He used to relate that as a boy he aided in taking down the old Thurston house in Troy and that the shingles were all fastened with little wooden pins, no nails being used. He m. in Fitchburg, Mass., May 31, 1836, Emily Gould, dau. of Sewell Gould, q. v., b. Oct. 24, 1807; d. Sept. 30, 1882. He lived first on the Lieut. David Gilmore farm, now (1929) owned by George A. Adams. Later he moved to the Gould farm, at Squantum Village, where he lived for the rest of his life, dying May 25, 1908, a. 96 years. He inherited the great strength and physical proportions of his ancestors, and came within a year of equalling the record for longevity established by his first American ancestor, Edward Garfield, who d. at 97. John Garfield was a thrifty farmer, a faithful member of the Baptist Church, a good neighbor and citizen. Many facts of interest regarding the people and events of his early days in Jaffrey related to the writer are preserved in these pages. Children:

(13) LUCIUS ANDREW⁹ GARFIELD (John⁸, Abraham⁷, John⁶, John⁵, John⁴, Capt. Benjamin³, Edward², Edward¹), b. March 11, 1849; m. Feb. 4, 1874, Ella M., dau. of Alfred and Sarah M. (Sawyer) Clark of Rindge. He lives on the fine hill farm occupied by the Goulds and Garfields for one hundred and fifty years. At eighty-four he retains in a remarkable degree the ancestral vigor and activity characteristic of the Garfield line. She d. May 23, 1929, a. 78 yrs., 9 mos., 3 days. Children:

(8) SOLOMON⁸ GARFIELD (Abraham⁷, John⁶, John⁵, Lt. Thomas⁴, Benjamin³, Edward², Edward¹), was the son of Abraham and Eunice (Thurston) Garfield. He was b. Landgrove, Vt., Jan. 2, 1819, and lived in Providence, R. I., Peterborough, N. H., and Vineland, N. J. He came to Jaffrey in 1876 and bought of Dea. Isaac Russell the farm (lot 17, range 3) owned in early days by Lt. Joseph Bates, now (1929) owned by his son Martin P. Garfield. He was a faithful member of the Congregational Church in Jaffrey; progressive in politics, and greatly interested in the cause of temperance, voting the third party Prohibition ticket for many of the last years of his life. He m. (1) Aug. 20, 1844, Loretta Fairbanks of Dublin, N. H., b. June 2, 1823, dau. of Moses and Jane (Harper) Fairbanks. His wife d. Sept. 3, 1855. He m. (2) Mary Eliza Richardson, b. July 31, 1829, dau. of Reuel and Betsy (Davis) Richardson. He d. Jaffrey, Oct. 17, 1899, a. 80 yrs., 9 mos.; buried in Dublin, N. H. She d. March 29, 1915, a. 85 yrs., 7 mos. Children:

Marlborough, 1853, dau. of Martin and Saba (Lucas) Hager. He has lived, Vineland, N. J., Peterborough and East Jaffrey, N. H., Sudbury, Mass., and lives (1929) in Dublin, N. H.

GARY

1. JONAS GARY, or Gerry, b. Sterling, Mass., 1761; d. Sept. 25, 1840, came to Jaffrey about 1816 from Marlborough, N. H., to which place he had removed from Fitzwilliam, N. H., about 1808. With his sons, Benjamin and William, he was a chairmaker, an occupation probably carried on in the Stanley mill near the west line of Jaffrey.

In 1820 he bought land in the north part of lot 5, range 4. He served as highway surveyor. He was a Revolutionary soldier. (See record in Vol. I.) He m. Mary, or Polly, Putnam, a sister of Gen. Israel Putnam, int. Nov. 27, 1785. She became insane at the age of thirty-two and remained in that condition until her death, Dec. 23, 1848, a. 88 yrs., 3 mos., 15 days. Children:

GELINAS

1. ALBERT¹ GELINAS, son of Nelson and Sarah (Daneau) Gelinas, was b. at Ste. Clothilde, Arthabaska Co., P. Q., Canada, March 7, 1866. He m. at St. Albert de Warwick, P. Q., Can., Apr. 30, 1890, Emeline Bouvette, b. Plessisville, Megantic Co., P. Q., Canada, March 31, 1873, dau. of Amedee and Elise (Beliveau) Bouvette. He came to the United States and settled in Athol, Mass. In 1912 he removed to Jaffrey and was employed until his death as a foreman in the factory of Bean & Symonds Co. In 1918 he bought the so-called Sanborn place now (1930) the Annex, Red Mill Inn, East Jaffrey. In 1921 he built the house north of Conant High School, now (1930) owned by his Estate. He d. Nov. 16, 1922, a. 56. Children:

GIBBS

The Gibbs family is of English origin and was transplanted into America from Fenton or Venton in Darlington Parish, England by MATTHEW¹ GIBBS who was a planter in Charlestown, Mass., at an early date; m. about 1650, Mary Bradish, dau. of Robert Bradish of Cambridge, removed to Sudbury, Mass., in 1654, and d. before 1697.

MATTHEW², the oldest of his seven children, was b. about 1655; m. (1) 1678, Mary Moore, b. Lancaster, Mass., 1655; m. (2) Elizabeth Moore, her sister, daus. of John and Ann (Smith) Moore. Removed to Framingham, Mass., where he d. March 9, 1732.

JOSEPH³, the fourth child, b. Oct. 7, 1687; m. July 1, 1712, Mercy Clark, b. Cambridge, Mass., Dec. 18, 1690, dau. of James Clark. Removed to Sudbury, 1717, where she d. Feb. 28, 1733/4. He d. Framingham, about 1754.

JOSEPH⁴, bp. Framingham, Mass., Sept. 13, 1719; m. Hannah Howe; lived in Rutland, Mass., and Princeton, Mass., where he d. May 12, 1774. She d. May 22, 1772.

JOSEPH⁵, b. Oct. 12, 1756; m. Jan. 9, 1787, Elizabeth, b. July 28, 1766, dau. of James and Ann (Danforth) Laws of Westminster, Mass.; she d. Nov. 10, 1809. He m. (2) June 19, 1811, Sally, dau. of Cyrus Fairbanks. Lived in Ashburnham, Mass. He d. March 19, 1829.

1. JONATHAN DANFORTH⁶ GIBBS (Joseph⁵, Joseph⁴, Joseph³, Matthew², Matthew¹) was b. at Ashburnham, Mass., May 24, 1796. He came to Jaffrey in 1821, and soon after bought the former Joshua Thorndike farm in School district No. 11, near the present residence of Ernest T. McCoy, where he was the last occupant. After eleven years he sold the place and removed to Jaffrey Center Village where he built the house now (1930) owned and occupied by Bowman F. Cann, and a shop where he carried on the business of manufacturing boots and shoes until age compelled him to retire. He was a public spirited citizen, greatly interested in town and church affairs. For forty-one years he kept a record of the deaths in the town which have been of inestimable value in the compilation of the present work, as the keeping of vital records was generally neglected by town officers, until sometime afterwards. In 1850 he published a map of the town compiled from his own surveys and research.

GILBERT

1. PHILIP S.² GILBERT, for thirty years a resident of Jaffrey, was b. in the Province of Quebec, Canada, Nov. 25, 1879, the oldest son of Philip¹ Gilbert, who was proprietor of the Granite State Hotel, East Jaffrey, in 1902. A brother, Frank Gilbert, also came to Jaffrey, and m. Rose Morin, b. Greenville, N. H. He lives (1932) in Lynn, Mass. For a few years Philip S. Gilbert was employed as a teamster, but for

the past fifteen years has been surveyor of lumber for the Bean and Symonds Co., East Jaffrey. He owns the so-called Carter place on the Turnpike, east of East Jaffrey Village. He m. Nov. 24, 1899, Ora M. LaBarge, b. Montreal, Can., Dec. 15, 1875, dau. of Eli LaBarge, who came to the United States and d. Fitchburg, Mass., in 1904. Children:

GILMORE

ROBERT¹ GILMORE, the immigrant ancestor of the Gilmore family of Jaffrey, was of Scotch descent. He was b. near Coleraine, County Derry, Ireland, about 1670. In 1719 he came to Londonderry, N. GOBEIL

GOFF

1. According to family tradition as related by Thomas K. Goff of Jaffrey, THOMAS GOFF, the immigrant ancestor of the family, was born of wealthy parents in Dublin, Ireland, and while a University student in Edinburgh, Scotland, preparing for a life of ease to which the family had been accustomed for generations, he was taken by a press gang and forced into the British military service. He came to America with Burgoyne's army and landed in Canada in 1776. The following summer found him with the advancing army in Vermont, at the battle of Bennington. Deeply resenting his enforced military service, he seized the opportunity to desert, and came to Jaffrey with the returning soldiers.

He m. Diadema Eaton, dau. of John Eaton, the Squantum mill owner (see *Eaton*), and lived in a house for many years known as the Goff place on the east shore of the present Contoocook Lake. The house, as stated by John Garfield, and confirmed by a highway record of the locality, was partly in the present highway in front of the cottage owned by Jones Brothers of Rindge, the traveled road at that time passing close by the shore of the pond. The place was not a desirable one so far as fertility of soil was concerned, and many stories were told of the owner's inept attempts at agriculture. He had never learned to perform manual labor of any sort and he was poorly equipped for the hard work and primitive conditions of a pioneer community. His desertion from the British army had made it impossible for him to return to his former home in Ireland. He finally became broken in spirit and mind, his wife became insane, and the family was for many years a town charge. He was often assisted by his father-in-law, John Eaton, who was reimbursed by the town. No record of his death has been found, but he undoubtedly died in Jaffrey, and was buried in an unmarked grave in the Old Town Burying Yard at Jaffrey Center. Mrs. Goff d. Feb. 20, 1816. GOODNOW

John Goodnow, aged 42, from Semley, Wiltshire, England, with his family; Thomas Goodnow, named below, from Shaftesbury, England; and Edmund Goodnow, aged 27, from Dunhead, Wiltshire, with wife Ann and sons John and Thomas, and servant, Richard Sanger—probably Richard Sanger, the progenitor of the Sanger family of Jaffrey, (see *Sanger*)—sailed for New England from Southampton, England, Apr. 11, 1638, in the ship "Confidence." John, Thomas and Edmund, brothers, were proprietors and pioneers of Sudbury, Mass., and became the progenitors of the Goodnow, or as sometimes spelled Goodenough, families in this country.

THOMAS¹ GOODNOW, the immigrant ancestor of the Goodnow family of Jaffrey, brought with him his wife Jane, son Thomas, one year old, and sister Ursula. He settled in Sudbury, where he was admitted freeman May 10, 1643. He was one of the original petitioners for Marlboro, Mass., where he was living at the time of its incorporation, and d. there in 1666—will dated Sept. 29, 1666, and proved Oct. 24, following. He was selectman in both Sudbury and Marlboro. The "Loveing yoak fellow Joane" mentioned in his will is probably his wife Jane and not a second wife Joanna, as some have read it. He owned, while in Jaffrey, the house on the turnpike road opposite the Baptist Church, now (1930) owned by the Estate of Wayland H. Goodnow. He was a keen trader and possessed the unusual business acumen which in a wider field brought marked success to his sons in later years. In Jaffrey he also engaged in farming and was for many years deacon of the Baptist Church. (5) WAYLAND H.⁸ GOODNOW (William Everett⁷, Ebenezer⁶, Edward⁵, Thomas⁴, Samuel³, Samuel², Thomas¹), a leading business man of Jaffrey, was b. in Dorchester, N. H., Oct. 24, 1855. He came to Jaffrey as a boy with his father's family, and was educated in the Jaffrey schools. For several years after becoming of age he carried on his father's farm in East Jaffrey Village of which upon the death of his father he became the owner. In 1890 the greater appeal of the the mercantile business brought him into partnership with the Goodnow Company in Jaffrey, of which he became director and treasurer, which positions he held until his death, Oct. 7, 1928. He was for many years a director of the Monadnock National Bank and for a few years up to the time of his death was president. He represented the town in the State Legislature in 1911, and served as a member of the Committee on Banks and Claims. He was an active member and deacon of the Baptist Church, and, though quiet and unassuming in all his ways, he bore well his part as a man of business, a good neighbor and useful citizen.

About 1640 he settled in that part of Ipswich, now Topsfield, Mass. He was, perhaps, the largest land owner in the region, owning 3000 acres at the time of his death, 1668.

GRAGG

Little is known of the antecedents of Hugh Gragg, whose sole claim to distinction is that he was a soldier of the Revolution and fought at Bunker Hill. His record, on which is based our claim to credit for his service as a soldier, is fully stated in Vol. I, Revolutionary History. According to the History of Windham, N. H., "four brothers by the name of Gregg, with their families, emigrated to America from Ireland and landed in Boston, Mass. Their names were John, Samuel, David and Andrew." Looking for a place of settlement they went first to Watertown, Mass., then almost a wilderness. David settled there. John and Andrew returned to Boston and took ship for Philadelphia, but still unsatisfied, John moved on to South Carolina where he prospered and left many descendants, some of whom rose to distinction. Samuel settled in Groton, Mass., and changed the spelling to Gragg. The family was generally noted for success in life, a trait conspicuously lacking in Hugh who came to Jaffrey. In Gilmore's record of New Hampshire men at Bunker Hill, Hugh Gragg is credited to Sliptown (Sharon), but this is clearly a confusion of individuals of identical names. There were two Hugh Graggs as shown by the Federal Census of 1790, one was of Jaffrey and the other of Peterborough, N. H. Hugh Gragg of Peterborough was thrifty and prosperous; Hugh Gragg of Jaffrey was constantly in distress, and for many years with his family, was largely supported by the town (see Vol. I, chapter on Town's Poor). Hugh Gragg of Peterborough moved to Sharon, N. H., sometime after 1790.

1. HUGH³ GRAGG of Jaffrey was b. probably in Groton, Mass., 1754. His ancestry as given by Miss A. Maude Taggart of Peterborough, was as follows: Samuel¹, immigrant, who settled in Groton; Hugh², b. Groton, 1701. Hugh³ Gragg came to Jaffrey, probably before the Revolution, as he was granted Jaffrey mileage for his service at Cambridge in 1775. On July 2, 1777, his name is found as witness to a deed in Jaffrey on that date. He m. Lucy Geary who was warned

out of Jaffrey, May 10, 1778. In 1786 the town acted upon, and rejected, an article "to see if the town will make Mr. Hugh Grag any allowance for bringing up his wifes child, viz John Gary." He lived for some years on the old road leading from the meeting-house to the present road from the improved mountain road to Dublin, by way of Shattuck Inn, in a small house near the site of the present summer cottage of Mrs. Evelyn W. GREENE (THEODORE P.)

He graduated at the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md., and was appointed Lieutenant by President Van Buren, Dec. 20, 1837; appointed Commander by President Franklin Pierce, Sept.

14, 1855; appointed Captain by President Lincoln, July 16, 1862; appointed Commodore by President Johnson, July 24, 1867, and Rear Admiral by President Grant, May 24, 1872. After a long and distinguished career in the service of his country, he died at Jaffrey, August 30, 1887, and is buried in the Ainsworth lot in the old Jaffrey Burying Yard.

Theodore Phinney Greene m. Oct. 17, 1849, Mary Minot Ainsworth, b. Jaffrey, Feb. 24, 1822; dau. of William and Mary Morse (Stearns) Ainsworth, (see *Ainsworth* record); and for several years after his marriage made his home in Brattleborough, Vermont. GRIFFIN

The name Griffin is of Welsh origin and traditions of the family point to a Scotch ancestry. Daniel Griffin, an early resident in Tewksbury, Mass., was probably a scion of the early Scotch families who came to New England in 1718 or soon after. He m. Beulah, surname unknown.

GROUT

The Grout family was famous in Europe even before John O'Groat's House gave its name to the northern extremity of Scotland; and few families in America have furnished so many men of outstanding character and ability as that of Capt. John Grout.

Capt. JOHN¹ GROUT was b. in England in 1615, and settled in Watertown, Mass., about 1640. He studied medicine in the Old Country and was soon called upon to exercise his skill in the New World to which few of his profession had penetrated. He removed from Watertown to Sudbury, Mass., where the citizens in October, 1662, petitioned the authorities that he be permitted to practice "the mystery of chirurgery." He was selectman of Sudbury for thirty years, and for forty years a member of the Sudbury Training Band, during most of which he was captain. The qualities of leadership displayed by him were manifested in a long and numerous line of descendants widely scattered over the country. He m. Sarah Busbee. He d. in 1697, leaving three sons, John, Jonathan, Joseph, and several daughters.

JONATHAN² was b. Sudbury, Mass., Aug. 1, 1658; m. Abigail Dix of Watertown, dau. of John and Abigail (Barnard) Dix. He inherited the homestead and lived in Sudbury.

1. Capt. JOHN³ GROUT (Jonathan², John¹), was b. in Sudbury, Oct. 14, 1704, and d. in Jaffrey, where he was the first permanent settler, in June, 1771. This remarkable man is said to have received a classical education and to have been for a time engaged in the practice of law. He was a large landowner in Lunenburg, Mass. In 1734 he was selectman and in 1737 and 1738 he was on a committee to hire a schoolmaster. In 1739-40 he was again selectman, assessor in 1741, and tythingman in 1741-2. He was selectman and moderator in 1742-3, and the same year was voted four shillings for his services to the town. At this period the people of Lunenburg were greatly interested in the newly granted Monadnock townships to which they contributed many of the first settlers. Dea. Jonathan Hubbard of Lunenburg, with whom Grout was closely associated in business and town affairs, was head of the syndicate of real estate or township, promoters known as the proprietors of Monadnock No. 2, (Jaffrey), which they purchased from the Masonian Proprietors, Nov. 30, 1749. In 1751, still an active citizen of Lunenburg, Grout was again em-

ployed to hire a schoolmaster; in 1753 he was again selectman and in 1754 a member of a town committee. This was the last appearance of his name on the records of Lunenburg and it is assumed that about this time, though somewhat past the age when men usually engage in pioneering, he came to Rindge and began a settlement near the outlet of Pool Pond. According to his own account in his later petitions for favors to the Masonian Proprietors, he settled in Monadnock No. 2 township (Jaffrey) in 1758. Here he claims to have been, with his family, for three years the only inhabitant of the township. (See Chapter on Settlement, Vol. I.) Col. John Grout m. in Lunenburg, Nov. 23, 1727, Johannah Boynton ("both of Turkey Hills"), b. Aug. 17, 1712, dau. of Hilkiah Boynton. John Grout d. in Jaffrey in 1771, and tradition says that he was buried where the meeting-house now stands. John and Johanna are said to have had fifteen children of whom a record of thirteen has been preserved. Their names are sufficient evidence of their heroic cast.

2 I. Major HILKIAH⁴, b. July 23, 1728; m. Submit Hawkes, b. Deerfield, N. H., about 1735; d. Weathersfield, Vt., 1817. He settled near Fort Hinsdale, on the Connecticut River, in New Hampshire. Here with Mrs. Jemima How and others his wife was taken captive by the Indians, in July, 1755, and with three small children was carried to Canada. During a captivity of three years she was treated with kindness, but was separated from her children and when ransomed was compelled to leave them behind. Three years later two of the children were recovered, but Hilkiah, the eldest, never returned, and evidence afterward was found that he was adopted by the Indians, lived with the Cattaraugus tribe in New York and became their chief. It is said that he took the name of Peter Westfall and was the progenitor of the distinguished family of that name in New York. Major Grout after the recovery of his family lived for a time in Northfield, Mass., but eventually settled in Weathersfield, Vt., where his wife d. at the age of 85.

H., where he was justice of the peace and a prominent citizen. He held many town offices and was a Commissary in the Revolutionary Army. He had eleven children, several of whom became distinguished and successful. Among his descendants have been governors and congressmen for the state of Vermont. He was much of his life in public office; commanded a regiment at the siege of Boston, where he was the friend and adviser of Washington and other leaders of the day. One of his biographers has said of him: "His talents were of a high order and he wrote with rare ability. He was a man of the world, considered ambitious and artful, but his patriotism none could doubt. He was with Caleb Strong, Elbridge Gerry, Fisher Ames and others, elected a member of Congress in 1789. At this time of life he is described as of medium height, very fleshy, fair complexion, and a very handsome man. He, after the fashion of the day, was extensively engaged in land speculation. He m. in 1760, Sarah, a dau. of Gov. Page of Massachusetts, with whom he is said to have previously lived, and settled in Petersham, Mass., on a farm owned by the governor. He had thirteen children. He d. in Dover, Mass., Sept. 8, 1807.

HALE or HAIL

OLIVER HALE, or HAIL, as the name was also spelled in the town records, was an early citizen of Jaffrey. He was by descent a member of the Heald family, and was a kinsman of Amos Heald of Jaffrey. (See *Heald*.) The name Heald was aforesaid pronounced *Hailed*, which in one or more families by easy transition became Hail, and finally Hale, though the common family name, Hale, has doubtless another derivation. The line of descent to Oliver⁵ Hale of Jaffrey was: Oliver⁴ Hail, Oliver³ Heald, Israel² Heald, John¹ Heald.

OLIVER⁴ HALE, Jr., son of Oliver³ and Hannah Heald, b. Stow, June 22, 1720; d. Leominster, May 7, 1799. He m. (1) Sarah Frost, who d. Leominster, Apr. 13, 1756, a. 35 yrs., 5 mos. He m. (2) Katherine, dau. of James and Judith (Poole) Boutelle, b. Sudbury, Mass., Oct. 7, 1732; d. Leominster, Mass., July 16, 1821. On Dec. 9, 1772, Oliver⁴ Hale of Leominster, "Gentleman," bought of Robert Clark of Londonderry, N. H., two lots of land in "Middle Monadnock No. 2, Township," lot No. 17 in the 9th range and lot No. 17 in the 10th range. Lot No. 17 in the 9th range embraced the present so-called Carey farm, near the outlet of Contoocook Lake, and No. 17 in the 10th range was the lot immediately south of the first named lot, extending to the Rindge town line and including the present cottage colony known as "Michigan," and a part of Contoocook Lake. Oliver Hale also owned other land in the vicinity, as on Jan. 2, 1773, for a consideration of forty pounds, he sold to Jonathan Priest of Leominster.

ter, "80 acres in Middle Monadnock No. 2," it being all the land lying upon the south side of the river (Mountain stream) belonging to lot 15 in the ninth range. This lot included the Lacy farm on the Rindge road, at present (1929) owned by Mrs. Harry C. Lacy of Medford, Mass. These transactions, doubtless intended as a mere speculation in wild lands in the new townships then the rage, mark the inception of the important Leominster Colony in Jaffrey, consisting of the Priests, Whitcombs, Hales, Pierces, Wheelocks, Carters, and other families. The following year, Feb. 26, 1774, Oliver Hale, Sr., sold to Samuel Pierce and Ephraim Whitcomb, both of Leominster, two lots of land "Lying in that tract of Land or Township called Middle Monadnock or Monadnock No. 2, Lot No. 17 in the 9th range and Lot No. 17 in the 10th range," above described, to "Samuel Pierce and Ephraim Whitcomb, both of Leominster," who became actual settlers on the land. In July, 1777, Ephraim Whitcomb sold to Oliver⁵ Hale and Luke Wheelock, brothers-in-law, "both of Jaffrey, yeomen," lot No. 17 in the 10th range, above described. Children:

(1) OLIVER⁵ HALE (Oliver⁴, Oliver³, Israel², John¹), b. Apr. 29, 1750; m. Dec. 24, 1771, Mary, dau. of Jonathan and Mary (Russell) Wheelock. She was bp. Leominster, Sept. 2, 1753. According to the Leominster record, "they resided in Jaffrey," where they prob-

ably removed soon after their marriage. Oliver Hale immediately became an important figure in the new township and his name frequently appears in the town records. He served as tythingman in 1774; was on a committee to divide the town into school districts; served as fence viewer, highway surveyor, and selectman. He was one of the first owners of pews in the meeting-house. He was for a time a considerable owner of real estate, but seems to have met with reverses in later life, perhaps as a result of ill health. In 1802 his taxes in small amount were abated by vote of the town and the following year he leased, at the option of the selectmen, a small piece of the former minister lot consisting of about three acres on the road to Dublin, near the north end of Thorndike Pond. He d. Jaffrey, in October, 1809, a. 58. Children:

(2) THOMAS HALE, who came to Jaffrey previous to 1795, was probably the Thomas Hale, son of Oliver and Katherine (Boutelle) Hale, and half brother of Oliver, Jr., of Jaffrey, b. Leominster, Oct. 9, 1759; d. Apr. 3, 1808. He m. June 14, 1781, Elizabeth, b. May 12, 1760; d. July 22, 1820, dau. of Thomas and Abigail Wilder. In 1795 John Gilmore sold to Thomas Hale, blacksmith, "of Jaffrey," "47 square rods of land by measure, laid off in lot 12 in the 7th range, described as at 'the crotch of the roads,'" near the river bridge—"easterly from Belknap's lower fulling mill," in the village latterly known as Slab City. This place was the site of a blacksmith shop for many years. In 1805 Thomas W. Hale, perhaps a son, sold the same premises to Stephen Williams, A.M., of Woodstock, Conn. No

further record of Thomas Hale is found in Jaffrey, but the name is later found in Stoddard and on Feb. 26, 1812, Thomas Hale of Marlowe, N. H., blacksmith, deeded land in Marlowe, to Reuben Hale. The connection, if any, with the Jaffrey family has not been established.

HALE (JOHN)

JOHN⁵ HALE, one of the Leominster Colony, settled in Jaffrey before the Revolution. He was of Heald ancestry and of distant kinship with Oliver and Thomas, above named, the line of descent from John Heald, the immigrant being, John¹ Heald, Israel² Heald, Israel³ Heald or Heild, Samuel⁴ Hale, John⁵ Hale.

Samuel⁴ was b. in Stow, Mass., Apr. 2, 1719; d. Leominster, 1745, where he was during the French and Indian Wars. Three generations of his family lived on the home farm on Monoosnuck Hill, three miles from Leominster Village. He was a man of great strength and physique; a great wrestler and Indian fighter, and many stories of his prowess were handed down in the family. Seven of his sons served in the Revolution, and four, Benjamin, David, Israel, and Silas, settled on adjoining farms in West Windsor, Vt.

1. JOHN⁵ HALE, the third son of Samuel, owned land on the east side of lot 12 in the 9th range, adjoining that of James Stevens. He sold this lot, Sept. 27, 1777, to Joseph Wright of Jaffrey, at which time he was named as of Leominster. He served in Capt. Joshua Wood's Co. of Minutemen at the time of the Lexington alarm. He m. June 18, 1778, Mary Whitcomb, b. Dec. 19, 1752, a sister of Ephraim Whitcomb of Leominster and Jaffrey. (See *Whitcomb*.) Another sister, Rebecca Whitcomb, m. Lt. Jacob Pierce of Jaffrey. (See *Pierce*.) According to the 1790 census he had a family consisting of two sons and three daughters. In April, 1790, he sold land in lot 17, range 10 and adjoining lots, about 100 acres in all, to Simeon Butters, q.v., and soon after removed to Reading, Vt., where he d. Apr. 13, 1826. Name of one child is known:

HALL

DEACON RICHARD¹ HALL of Stratford-on-Avon, England, with his brother John, came to America, bringing his family with him, and settled in Dorchester, Mass. About 1672 he removed to Bradford, Mass., where he was made a freeman in 1676, and was chosen one of the first two deacons of the church at Bradford, in 1682, which office he held until his death, March 9, 1730. He m. Martha, surname unknown. Children: (1) Sarah. (2) John. (3) *Richard*, b. February, 1676. (Forward.) (4) Joseph. (5) Joanna.

RICHARD², b. Bradford, Mass., Feb. 6, 1676, was an active citizen. Late in life he removed to Harvard, Mass., and d. soon after 1750. He m. Apr. 24, 1699, Abi-

gail Dalton, who d. about 1710. He m. again but name of second wife is unknown.

Deacon NATHAN³, b. Bradford, Mass., Dec. 25, 1715, settled in Dracut, Mass., removing in 1747 to Pepperell, Mass., and four years later to Mason, N. H., where he d. May 7, 1807. He m. 1742, Mary Chapman, b. Bradford, March 29, 1723; d. Oct. 27, 1810. Nine children:

1. NATHAN⁴ HALL (Nathan³, Richard², Richard¹), b. Pepperell, Mass., Aug. 23, 1748; m. Eleanor Bryant, b. Sept. 19, 1747, dau. of Kendall and Mary Bryant. (See *Bryant*.) He came to Jaffrey about 1777, and in 1780 he was seated in the meeting house, pew No. 40. He lived on lot 16, range 5, on or near the present (1931) farm of Peter N. Proctor. He served as fence viewer (1779) and highway surveyor (1783). In November, 1782, he was chosen with Samuel Pierce, Capt. Spaulding, Lt. Samuel Buss and Samuel Emery, on a committee "to take Care of the Meeting house" on the day of the ordination of Rev. Laban Ainsworth (Dec. 11, 1782). In 1784 he was a member of the Jaffrey Training Band. He was a Revolutionary soldier. (See record, Vol. I.) Sometime between 1790 and 1793 he removed to Springfield, Vt., and for some years after that the town held a note against him, of \$14.34, which, it was voted in 1801, "the treasurer of this town be directed to deliver up to Mr. Nathan Hall." She d. Feb. 11, 1841. Children, b. Mason, N. H.:

He is a successful business man of Jaffrey, and was for several years a blacksmith, but with the development of automobile traffic his shop became an auto repair shop, which with added buildings developed into the present garage and auto

service station known as the East Jaffrey Garage. He built in 1901, a house on North street, East Jaffrey, which is still his place of residence. He m. in Swanzey, N. H., Feb. 15, 1899, Kate F. Blake, b. Swanzey, July 15, 1872, dau. of Alfred and Martha (Read) Blake. Children:

HAMMOND

THOMAS¹ HAMMOND, immigrant ancestor of many of the name who have won success in America, was b. at Melford, County Suffolk, England, where with his twin brother, John, he was bp. Sept. 2, 1603. He was first cousin of William Hammond of Watertown, Mass., from whom the Hammond families later named were descended. He m. in Lavenham, Eng., Nov. 12, 1623, Elizabeth, dau. of Robert and Prudence (Hammond) Cason. He was one of the first settlers of Hingham, Mass., where he had a land grant in 1636. With other Hingham pioneers he removed to what is now Newton, Mass., where his homestead was near a beautiful pond still known as Hammond's Pond. He d. 1675, leaving a large estate for his day. Children: (1) *Thomas*. (Forward.) (2) Elizabeth, b. 1633/4. (3) Sarah, bp. 1640. (4) Nathaniel, bp. 1643.

THOMAS², b. in England about 1630; d. Newton, Mass., Oct. 20, 1678, of small pox. He m. Dec. 17, 1662, Elizabeth Stedman, who d. in Newton, in 1715. He cultivated the farm inherited from his father. Children: (1) Elizabeth, b. 1664. (2) Thomas, b. 1666. (3) *Isaac* (twin), b. 1668. (Forward.) (4) Sarah (twin), b. Dec. 20, 1668. (5) Nathaniel. (6) John. (7) Eleazer, b. Nov. 13, 1677.

ISAAC³, was b. Newton, Mass., Dec. 20, 1668; d. Newton, Jan. 1, 1715. He m. Dec. 7, 1692, Ann, b. July 3, 1672; d. 1719, dau. of Elijah and Hannah (Jackson) Kendrick of Newton. Seven children.

JONATHAN⁴, b. Newton, Mass., Feb., 1706, settled in Woodstock, Ct., where he was one of the founders of the Baptist Church; m. Katherine, surname unknown.

JOSIAH⁴, brother of Jonathan⁴, was a farmer in Hampton, Ct. He d. Oct. 5, 1793, "in ye 94th yr of his age."

ABEL⁵ (Jonathan⁴, Isaac³, Thomas², Thomas¹), bp. Woodstock, Ct., July 2, 1738; d. Winchester, N. H., Feb. 24, 1807. He m. Sarah, surname unknown, b. 1739; d. Feb. 24, 1807. He settled in Winchester, N. H., before 1775, and was a farmer. Ten children. (Seth and Elisha forward.)

HEZEKIAH⁵ (Josiah⁴, Isaac³, Thomas², Thomas¹), was a farmer in Hampton, Ct., and a Revolutionary soldier.

SETH⁶, (Abel⁵, Jonathan⁴, Isaac³, Thomas², Thomas¹), was b. Winchester, N. H., Jan. 30, 1777; d. there, Apr. 17, 1863. He was a farmer. He m. Feb. 18, 1802, Nancy Bent, b. Sudbury, Mass., May 5, 1782; d. Winchester, Sept. 25, 1865. Nine children.

ELISHA⁶ (Hezekiah⁵, Josiah⁴, Isaac³, Thomas², Thomas¹), b. Hampton, Ct., May 26, 1780; d. West Brookfield, Mass., May 12, 1851; m. (1) Phebe Parsons Hitchcock. He was educated at Yale College and was a lawyer in New York City. He was of a studious nature and was the author of a standard work on Marine and Fire Insurance, and also of a compendious work in four volumes on *Evidence*. Two of his children lived in Jaffrey.

1. FRANCES P.⁷ HAMMOND (Elisha⁶, Hezekiah⁵, Josiah⁴, Isaac³, Thomas², Thomas¹), b. West Brookfield, Mass., Sept. 5, 1819, was a deaf mute, but otherwise very intelligent and greatly loved and respected by all who knew her. She m. Eldad Austin Prescott, also a deaf mute, and lived in Squantum village. (See *Prescott*.)

2. ELISHA GRIFFIN⁷ HAMMOND (Elisha⁶, Hezekiah⁵, Josiah⁴, Isaac³, Thomas², Thomas¹), brother of Frances P. Hammond, was b. at West Brookfield, July 21, 1822. He removed with his parents to New York City when eight years of age. Through the influence of David Henshaw, Secretary of the Navy under President Tyler, a friend of the family, he was appointed to the military academy at West Point, but not caring for a military life he withdrew after one year. Doubtless through the influence of his sister Frances, he came to Jaffrey and was for some years a merchant at Squantum Village. While here he m. in Brattleboro, Vt., Sept. 18, 1847, Sarah L. Oakes of Petersham, Mass., probably of the Beriah Oaks family. He afterward went West and lived in many localities including some years in Nevada, and afterward at Berkeley, Cal., which place probably through his influence became the home of others from Jaffrey, including John Quincy Garfield, and Miss Jennie Prescott, a niece of his sister, and at present it is the home of Miss Amy Poole, a niece of Miss Prescott. Nov. 26, 1825, dau. of Royal G. and Rebekah (Butler) Evans of Brattleborough, Vt. He d. Winchester, N. H., March 4, 1899. Nine children.

5. REUBEN GRANT⁸ HAMMOND (Elisha⁷, Seth⁶, Abel⁵, Jonathan⁴, Isaac³, Thomas², Thomas¹) was b. in Winchester, N. H., March 30,

1871. He m. in Ellington, Ct., Oct. 28, 1903, Rosena Hahn, b. Ellington, Ct., Aug. 30, 1880, dau. of Philip and Phillipena (Stiefe) Hahn. In 1915 he settled in Dublin, N. H., on the Orison H. Moore place near the Jaffrey line, but in 1920 removed to Jaffrey where he now lives (1930) in the house he built on Prospect Hill Road west of East Jaffrey Village, where he is engaged in the poultry business. He was for many years a lumber operator. Child:

HAMMOND (WILLIAM)

1. JACOB⁷ HAMMOND, of a different family from that above recorded, came to Jaffrey from Waltham, Mass., in 1818, and lived until 1831 on the farm before occupied by Jonas Brooks, on the so-called old Keene road from The Ark. In 1833, with his son Jacob, who paid an equal tax, he bought the farm on the north side of the Turnpike next west of the present Nightingale place. This place formerly owned by Rufus Houghton, Seth Ellis and others, has been long abandoned. He was b. in Waltham, March 11, 1775, and was seventh in descent from William¹ Hammond, b. England, Lavenham, County Suffolk, bp. 1575; came to America about 1632 and lived in Boston and Scituate, Mass. (A sister m. John Page, see *Page*.) The line of descent to the Jaffrey family was: William¹, Thomas², Thomas³, Thomas⁴, Thomas⁵, Ephraim⁶, Jacob⁷. Jacob⁷ Hammond m. at Newton, Mass., Apr. 10, 1800, Caty Adams. She d. and he m. (2) Olive Newell, who d. Jaffrey, Aug. 11, 1859, a. 80. He d. Aug. 25, 1860, a. 85, buried in Jaffrey. Children:

HANNAFORD

The ancestry of the Jaffrey representatives of the Hannaford family of New England has been traced to James Hannaford, b. June 6, 1773; m. in Bedford, Mass., Nov. 13, 1793, Lydia Russell, b. Apr. 1, 1773. The family is of English descent but the name of the immigrant ancestor and the date of his arrival in America have not been established. James Hannaford moved from Northfield, Mass., to Peterborough, N. H., in 1822, and d. there Sept. 2, 1839. His widow m. (2) Aug. 9, 1849, Luther Adams, and d. Apr. 30, 1853, a. 80. They had thirteen children, with birthplaces in five different towns in New Hampshire and Vermont. Jesse M. and William S., twins, second and third of the family, were b. in Peacham, Vt., Feb. 17, 1796. Jesse M. d. in Peterborough, Jan. 21, 1855. He m. Susan T. Quimby, b. Sanbornton, N. He came to Jaffrey as a young man, before Apr. 1, 1851, and was employed in the cotton mill of Alonzo Bascom. He was also active in the social life of the village for about ten years. About 1860 he removed to Wyoming, Jones Co., Iowa, and engaged in farming, but in the unsettled conditions of the times, feeling that the new country would be overrun by the Civil War, he sold his farm and returned to Jaffrey. From here he soon after removed to Northfield, Vt., and thence to St. Albans, where he d. Jan. 12, 1875; buried in Jaffrey. His wife returned to Jaffrey and lived in the family of her mother, Mrs. Elvira (Jewett) Pierce, in the house now (1932) owned by Alfred M. Butler. Not long before her death she went to St. Paul, Minn., where she d. at the home of her son, J. M. Hannaford. She is buried in Jaffrey. Eli R. Hannaford, m. in Jaffrey, June 19, 1848, Paulina A., b. June 30, 1830, dau. of Ezra and Elvira (Maynard) Jewett. (See *Jewett* and *Maynard*.) During their Jaffrey

residence of about twelve years they lived in a tenement of the Durant house, on the Village Square, now (1932) owned by Romolo Vanni. Mrs. Hannaford and Mrs. Luther Durant were sisters. HANSCOM

1. CHARLES HANSCOM, a wheelwright, came from Charlestown, Mass., to Jaffrey in 1842, and was for nearly forty years a well known and respected citizen of the town. He owned a wheelwright shop near the river, on the north side of the road east of the site of the present stone bridge in the north part of East Jaffrey Village. It was later owned as a paint shop by his son, Theodore, and was burned in the great fire of June 28, 1868. Charles Hanscom also owned the Hanscom house on the Village Square, in later years owned by Edward A. HARKNESS

1. ROBERT HARKNESS, of Scotch Irish extraction, came to Jaffrey from New Ipswich, N. H., soon after the Revolution. He was a prominent and respected citizen but not an office seeker. He was by trade a cordwainer (shoemaker) and this being in line of his occupation he was for twenty years chosen sealer of leather. He also served as highway surveyor and for one year as constable and tax collector. His numerous deals in real estate indicate that he was a man of business enterprise and in comfortable circumstances. He settled first on a small tract of land on the Rindge town line near the Wheelock Stratton farm. On Aug. 21, 1780, he bought of John Harkness of New Ipswich, lot 15, range 5, including the Russel Henchman farm on the old road from Jaffrey Center over Cutter hill to the Dublin road east of the present residence of Peter N. Proctor. It is probable that Robert Harkness built the present house on the premises, now (1931) the summer residence of the heirs of Attila Manzone of New York. He m. Dec. 30, 1788, Sarah, dau. of John and Priscilla (Mace) French of Jaffrey. (See *French*.) No children. He d. July 16, 1807, a. 57. His widow m. (2) William Stevens, Esq. (See *Stevens*.) He responded to the Lexington alarm from New Ipswich. Elizabeth Harkness from Lunenburg, Mass., presumably a sister of Robert, m. in Jaffrey, Rev. Robinson Smiley. (See *Smiley*.)

Framed into the ceiling of the basement of the brick meeting-house in Jaffrey Center is the original gravestone of Robert Harkness replaced by his widow with one of later design. It bears the inscription:

Atient was he of fortune friend,

(5) JOHN² HARPER (Andrew¹), bp. Harvard, Mass., Sept. 25, 1740, was one of the pioneer settlers of Jaffrey named in the reports of Gilmore and Grout (1768) and of Enoch Hale (1770). He settled on lot 9, range 7, afterwards owned by his son William Harper and now (1931) by Mr. and Mrs. William C. Royce, Sr. When the town was organized (1773) Lt. John Harper was chosen field-driver, and afterwards he served as constable, highway surveyor, and in 1779 he was chosen on a committee of ten to divide the town into ten school districts. He served in the French and Indian War in the company of Col. James Reed of Lunenburg, Mass., in the garrison at Halifax in 1761. When the news of the Lexington alarm reached Jaffrey he was one of the first to take up the line of march and enlisted at Cambridge for the months following. (See Revolutionary record, Vol. I.) Lt. HARRINGTON

I. SETH HARRINGTON was of the fifth generation from Robert Harrington, the immigrant, in the following line: Robert¹, John², John³, Richard⁴, Seth⁵. Richard⁴ was of Nottingham West (now Hudson, N. H.), and m. Abigail Hammond. Eleven children. Seth⁵ Harrington was b. in Lexington, Mass., Oct. 30, 1752; lived in Shirley, Mass., during the Revolution, and is credited with long service. (See record, Vol. I.) According to the *History of Shirley*, there is no evidence that he was married or had a home of his own in that place, but as report has it, "He was not without his uses" on account of his long Revolutionary service, including some of the hardest fought battles of the war. Beyond his Revolutionary service he left no record in Shirley. No record of his marriage or birth of the first three children has been found, but Seth Harrington came to Jaffrey before 1784, at which time he was a member of the Training Band. In 1789, Oct. 30, Seth Harrington "of Jaffrey" sold the "farm I now live on," "19 acres more or less" to Adam Brown of Salt Ash, Windsor Co., Vermont. This farm consisted of a ten acre rectangular lot in the southwest part of lot 7, range 3, and an adjoining lot of about nine acres in the northwest corner of lot 7, range 4, above the present Poole Reservoir of the Jaffrey Water Works, as shown on map of

Monadnock Mountain, published 1928, by Allen Chamberlain. The whole of lot 7, range 3, except that belonging to Seth Harrington was sold in 1789 to Wallace Little, Jr., of Shirley, which is presumptive evidence of Seth Harrington's earlier connection with that town.

Seth Harrington, after the sale of his mountain real estate, continued to live in Jaffrey as shown by the Federal Census of 1790 and the records of Marlborough, N. H., until the early part of 1793, when "Seth Harrington from Jaffrey" was warned from that town. He continued his residence in Marlborough until his death March 3, 1808, and two children were b. there. He m. Rebecca, dau. of Abraham Brooks, residence unknown. They both appear to have been eccentric characters as indicated by the honorary titles of "King" and "Queen" bestowed upon them by their fellow townsmen. Mrs. Harrington was known as a fortune teller. "Queen Harrington," according to a record of persons dying in Marlborough, above 80 years of age, died in Marlborough, Apr. 12, 1840, aged 90. Marlborough, March 5, 1801; m. Apr. 22, 1834, Rebecca, b. Aug. 5, 1808, dau. of John and Mary (Batchelder) Cutter of Jaffrey. (See *Cutter*.) He came to Jaffrey in 1835, and lived on lot 9, range 3, north of the Ark; removed to lot 5, range 5. In 1873 he removed to East Jaffrey Village where he bought the house on North Street, now (1929) owned by Andrew Pelletier, and returned to Marlborough, N. H., in 1879. Children:

HATCH

It was a common custom in the back towns of early New England for families to set apart a plot of ground on the home farm where they might lay their dead. They had entered a new country which was to be their inheritance forever, never doubting but on resurrection morn they would rise again, as one kindred, to abide the judgment of the Great Day. They little thought that Time's effacing fingers would soon wear smooth the mortuary stones they set up and lettered with such care, and that before three generations were gone they, too, would need the memorial of the printed page.

The Hatch family is one of long and high standing in New England, and its genealogical record, intended to include all of the ancestral name wherever dispersed, has been written with filial devotion and care, and yet this great family has its lost tribes, which prolonged search has failed to trace to their ancestral source. The following brief record of one of these strayed branches of the parent stock is unique among all those gathered in this book, because it is derived, not from the memory of the living or the archives of town or state, but from the silent stones of an abandoned graveyard, themselves choked by the returning wilderness and about to give up the ghost and lie down in the earth from which they came.

In the town of Halifax, Vermont, is one of these abandoned graveyards that still preserves, but not for long, the memory of a small branch of the Hatch family

that the genealogists have missed and all but a few devoted descendants have forgotten. It is the fading memory of a family once strong in those parts, and the requiem of a people who are gone.

In a small patch of ground, walled for protection from the grazing herds, that have likewise gone, are still to be found the few remaining memorials of two strong families, the Hatches and the Stacys. They were neighbors in life, and in death were not separated. The place is back a hundred rods from the highway and two miles from the town. It is about a half acre in extent, but even this limited area proved more than sufficient for its purpose. Like a venturesome bark cast away in some remote uncharted sea, or a lost tribe that ventured too far into an unknown wilderness, they came here, lived their little span and died. Whence they came no record has been found, and the few that escaped took with them no tribal memories.

One of the fifth generation from the Halifax pioneer, and among the last of the name born in Halifax, is Arthur M. Hatch of Jaffrey, who has devoted much time and care to reviving the memory of his ancestors. His mother, Sadie (Goodnow) Hatch, died when he was two weeks old, and his father, Charles H. Hatch, moved away before the old home had painted itself on his childish memory. When he reached manhood, the death of his father reminded him of a duty to an almost forgotten ancestry which he would not willingly evade. In the records of town or state he found no information and the printed genealogies under the family name had strangely omitted all reference to his immediate ancestors. He had only one recourse. Gravestones, it has been said, are our introduction to the dead. He sought the family graveyard and found that he had come none too soon. Some of the stones of Vermont marble had fallen down and given up their trust. On others the wind, the frost and the rain of many years had worn away nearly all of the inscriptions they held so bravely up to view. The graves in this small and forsaken enclosure are not strictly separated into family groups. Rather would it seem that company was more essential than family ties. The names and dates have been carefully copied and suggest the following groupings by generations and families.

The oldest of the name, and plainly the most honorable, was James H. Hatch, Esquire. He had no forerunners there. He died in Halifax, Nov. 30, 1831. Esther, who rests by his side, was his faithful consort. They had children, but no birth dates are given, only names, ages and dates of death are recorded.

Heath, Mass., March 8, 1873, dau. of Dudley W. and Miranda (Fairbanks) Burrington. She is a descendant of William Burrington, who came early from England and settled in Providence, R. I. Her brother, Bert Burrington, lives (1932) in East Jaffrey. Arthur M. Hatch came to Jaffrey from Keene, N. H., where he was employed by the Goodnow Syndicate Stores, in 1906, and he has since been connected as a stockholder and store manager with Goodnow Bros. & Company of Jaffrey. In 1911 he built the house on the Main street or Turnpike road, East Jaffrey, where he still resides (1933). No children.

HATCH (LAURENCE B.)

1. DR. LAURENCE B. HATCH, a distinguished member of a sturdy New England family, traced his ancestry to Noah Hatch, b. in Hartford, Conn., in 1766. He was b. in Northumberland, N. H., Apr. 28, 1878, the son of Antipas Morton and Mary R. (Platt) Hatch. His mother, still living in Santa Monica, California, is a popular writer, novelist and playwright. Dr. Hatch received his education at St. Johnsbury Academy and Dartmouth College, from which institution he was graduated with the degree of Doctor of Medicine in 1901. In 1902 he came to Rindge where he remained in practice until 1913, when he removed to Jaffrey as successor to Dr. Franklin G. Humiston, deceased. In 1917 he enlisted for service in the World War and in

July, 1918, sailed for France, where he had a part with the Fourth Division in the famous movement of American troops on the Argonne Front. He returned to the United States in July, 1919, and was mustered out of service with the rank of captain. After his military service he again took up his practice in Jaffrey which he continued successfully until compelled to retire on account of failing health in 1932. In July, he went to California, in the hope of benefit from changed environment, but failed rapidly and d. at the Veterans Hospital, Los Angeles, Sept. 13, 1932. He is buried in the Home Cemetery in that city.

He m. (1) 1902, Margaret M., dau. of Edward and Georgianna (Girard) Champagne of Littleton, N. H.; divorced. He m. (2) May 30, 1927, Edith R., dau. of Arland B. and Elizabeth (Morgan) Hunt of Jaffrey, who survives him. Two sons by first marriage:

HATHORN

The founders of the Hathorn family in America were William and John, sons of William Hathorn of Binfield, Berkshire County, England. These men wrote the name Hathorne and pronounced it Hawthorne. The original form is said to have been Hawthorne, as retained by the celebrated author, a descendant of William Hawthorne. The Jaffrey families of the name were probably descendants of John¹, who settled in Salem, Mass., in 1635; m. Sarah ———; removed to Malden, Mass., where he was licensed to keep an ordinary (tavern). He moved again in 1665, to Lynn, Mass., at which time, according to deposition by him made, he was forty-two years of age. His will dated 19 October, 1676, names wife Sarah and children, Ebenezer, Priscilla Shore, Marah, Phebe and Nathaniel. (Pope, *Pioneers of New England*.) He d. Dec. 12, 1676. Another record names children of John Hathorne: (1) William, b. November, 1651; d. Sept. 14, 1676. (2) Mary, b. July, 1653; d. Dec. 31, 1676. (3) *Ebenezer*², b. 1656. (Forward.) (4) Phebe, b. March 22, 1665. A duplication of names of children of William and John makes the line of descent in the two succeeding generations uncertain, but the following seems the most probable succession.

EBENEZER², son of John¹ and Sarah, b. Mar., 1656; m. Dec. 26, 1683, Hester Witt.

EBENEZER³, probably son of Ebenezer and Hester, bp. March, 1685. Mary³, dau. of Ebenezer and Ester (Hester ?), b. June 5, 1687.

EBENEZER⁴, "great-grandson of John the founder," and probably a son of Ebenezer³, lived in Andover, Mass. He m. 1730, (int. Lynn, Mass., Oct. 11, 1730) Keziah Collins, b. Lynn, Nov. 27, 1704, dau. of Eleazer and Rebecca (Newhall) Collins. They had several children, three or more of whom came to Jaffrey.

He came to Jaffrey before Apr. 22, 1772, on which date George Wallace of Middle Monadnock No. 2, sold to "Collands Hathorn, Trader," of the "township and Province aforesaid," one lot of land (100 acres) being lot 18, in the 5th range of lots. April 23, 1785, Collins sold to Benjamin (son), for £150, part of the above lot, adjoining land of Jacob Baldwin; witnesses, Keziah Collins and Seth Tomson. He was a soldier of the Revolution. (See record, Vol. I.) Collins Hathorn, like many members of the family, was a blacksmith, and specialized in the manufacture of steelyards. He was also denominated a trader, which may mean that he was a peddler of the essential articles made by his brother Ebenezer and himself, also by his brother-in-law Hiram Dean. Collins and Sarah (Dean) Hathorn had eleven or more children, four of whom lived in Reading, Vt.

Collins Hathorn d. in Jaffrey, probably in 1788, in which year his widow Sarah was appointed administratrix of his estate. The inventory of his estate is as follows:

HAYWOOD (JAMES)

1. JAMES HAYWOOD, son of James and Susanna Haywood of Wilmington, Mass., b. Nov. 7, 1744, was one of the earliest settlers of Jaffrey. He m. Dec. 7, 1771, Keziah Butters, dau. of Samuel and Kezia (Dana) Butters of Wilmington. (See *Butters*.) The previous month, Nov. 13, 1771, Samuel Butters, 3rd, of Wilmington, bought of Josiah Monroe the north half of lot 22, range 8, with buildings thereon. Butters was a brother of James Haywood's wife and this transaction probably brought both the Butters and Haywood families to Jaffrey. He came to Jaffrey soon after his marriage (or possibly had begun settlement before that time) as shown by a deed from John Swan of Peterborough Slip, of a half lot of land—"ye west half of No. 20, Range 6," by a straight line from north to south—dated June 24, 1772, in which, as grantee, he is described as James Haywood of Monadnock No. 2 (Jaffrey). On the same date the east half of this lot was sold to Benjamin Nutting of Woburn, Mass. (See *Nutting*.) In 1773, Dec. 31, Kneeland Abbott of Jaffrey, (Jaffrey incorporated 1773) sold to James Haywood of Jaffrey, the north half of lot 22, range 8, adjoining Sliptown line, for 630 pounds Lawful Money. This was afterward the Nutting farm and later of Josiah and Cummings Sawyer, now (1930) owned in part by Oren Lemay. Several real estate transactions are recorded in the name of James Haywood, all in the same neighborhood near the present Sawyer and Wilson farms, which make it difficult to determine his exact place of residence. In 1777, Dec. 23, James Haywood bought of Lucy Hildreth the south half of lot 22, range 8, "with all buildings standing on sd premises." This place, known as Witt Hill and (1930) a part of the J. M. and J. C. Sawyer farm, was probably his home for several years. There is a tradition that the house of James Haywood was moved from its location on the back road from the present Lemay place to Pierce Crossing, to East Jaffrey and was the well known Crombie house on Main Street, lately turned about to face Depot Square, to make room for the new Bean Block erected in 1928.

James Haywood responded to the Lexington alarm from Jaffrey in April, 1775, when his travel allowance of "70 miles out and 70 miles home" indicates unmistakably a Jaffrey residence. In 1779 he was elected highway surveyor, and the following year, selectman. With his wife, Keziah, he was a member of the Jaffrey church when it was organized in 1780. He was also a member of the Jaffrey Training Band in 1784. By the census of 1790, his family consisted of 2 males

over 16, including head of family; 1 male under 16; and 2 females including head of family. A daughter Keziah m. Oliver Prescott, a brother of Col. Benjamin Prescott, and removed to Whitestown, N. Y. James Haywood d. in Jaffrey and no further mention of his family has been found. It is probable that they removed to Western New York, whither the daughter named had already gone with many others from Jaffrey. The relationship of James Haywood to Benjamin Haywood of Jaffrey has not been precisely determined, but it is believed to have been close as the two lived in near neighborhood and business relations, and this relationship probably influenced the removal of Benjamin Haywood to Jaffrey, where he became the owner of land adjoining that of his predecessor.

HAYWOOD (JOHN)

James and John Haywood, supposed to be brothers, came to America in 1635 in the ship "Planter," and settled in Concord, Mass. They were certified from Stepney Parish, London, aged about 20 years. JOHN HAYWOOD was married in 1656, and is said to have had a family of sixteen children. He d. in 1700 or 1701.

BENJAMIN² (John¹), b. Concord, Mass., 1683, removed to Billerica, Mass., and in 1728 bought of Thomas Adams, the Haywood homestead in Chelmsford, Mass., which remained in the family for 194 years until sold in 1922. The date of purchase as copied from the original deed was "the 29th day of May Anno Domini one thousand seven hundred and twenty eight and in the first year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord Geo. the Second."

JAMES³, b. Billerica, Dec. 13, 1724, removed to Chelmsford with his father's family, and thereafter lived on the homestead until his death, Nov. 6, 1791, at the age of 66 yrs. He m. Sarah Emery, who d. March 31, 1802, a. 75 yrs. A son, Joseph⁴, lived on the homestead and d. Sept. 5, 1805, a. 45.

1. BENJAMIN⁴, (James³, Benjamin², John¹), b. Chelmsford in 1754, served in the Revolution and is said to have been wounded at the battle of Bunker Hill. (See record, Vol. I.) He came to Jaffrey about 1780 where he was a blacksmith and farmer. He settled on lots No. 21 and 22 in the 8th range of lots, to which was added about seven acres in the northwest corner of the adjoining lot 21 in the 9th range by purchase from his neighbor, Benjamin Prescott. The object of this purchase, on which June 7, 1782, he raised his first frame house, was evidently to give him access to the highway. The location of this house was about 150 feet north of the present house on the premises, and is approximately located by the old well to the left of the driveway of the barn of the present owners, J. M. and J. C. Sawyer. The original road was immediately south of the buildings and bearing southeast from this point it crossed the location of the present road a

few rods east of the height of land and entered the former Rindge and Peterborough road south of the old No. 1 school house. Benjamin Haywood was a man of ability and enterprise, and so prospered that in time he was able to build for his son Benjamin, Jr., the present substantial house on the premises. It is said that the timber from the old house was used in constructing the ell of the present residence. For several years he occupied the shop underneath the large elm opposite the Prescott place on the turnpike, and afterward built a shop south of the turnpike, opposite the present Sawyer homestead.

HEATH

The Heath family of Jaffrey may probably trace their ancestry to Bartholomew Heath, an early resident of Newbury, Mass., who removed to Haverhill, Mass., and whose descendants by successive migrations moved to central New Hampshire and thence crossed the border into Vermont and into Canada. The given name Josiah appears for five successive generations of the descendants of Bartholomew, and reappears in Josiah S. Heath of Jaffrey, while in another equally numerous Heath family, descended from William Heath who settled in Roxbury, Mass., about 1630, this name has not been found.

DAVID HEATH, whose immediate ancestry has not been discovered, was b. about 1795, served in the War of 1812, and was engaged in the battle of Plattsburg. He

HECKER

1. Among our citizens of foreign birth who responded promptly to the call of their adopted country at the outbreak of the Civil War, was JOHN¹ HECKER, b. Baden, Germany, Jan. 14, 1826, son of Stephen and Susanna (Schneider) Hecker. He came to America about 1850, and about 1854 settled in Jaffrey, where he spent most of his life. He is remembered as a singer of some talent, a good neighbor and an honest man. In 1859 he bought of Michael Downs and Patrick Reardon the Cummings farm, recently known as the Milliken Place (now abandoned) near Hubbard Pond in Rindge. In social and trade connections this place was tributary to East Jaffrey so that the Hecker family remained virtually residents of Jaffrey. He sold this place in 1870, to Francis J. Morlock, and the same year bought the James D. Sawyer place (now abandoned) in the southwest part of Jaffrey. From 1877 to October, 1899, he lived on Squantum Road, East Jaffrey Village, on the place near the Humiston Playground, owned (1929) by Cyril Forcier. He later built the house on Sawyer Hill now owned by his grandson, William Oscar Howard, where he d. Sept. 3, 1900. He m. Feb. 17, 1856, Mrs. Alice (Oldham) Whitehead, dau. of William and Mary (Hilton) Oldham, b. Newton, England, Jan. 31, 1823. (See *Whitehead*.) Children:

Dwelling house and Barn thereon standing." Jason Hemenway sold this lot in April, 1776, to Dea. Daniel Emery of Townsend, Mass., and in September of the same year, he bought of Matthew Wallace, a one-time clerk of the Proprietors of Monadnock No. 2, lot 20, range 6, now (1929) the farm of Clark M. Pierce. He sold this farm in April, next following, to John Cutter of New Ipswich, N. H., and removed to Groton, Mass., soon after. He m. Lucy, surname unknown. At the annual March meeting in 1775, Jason Hemenway, Phineas Spaulding and Roger Gilmore were chosen a committee to "Count with the Selectmen and Constable." Children:

HENCHMAN

The name HENCHMAN was originally derived from the word haunchman, an old Saxon name given to a knight's armor-bearer in days of chivalry, but later only the king and the great feudal baron had his henchman. As a surname it is more than 450 years old and was first borne by one Crosborough of the County of Northampton, England. The change was made in 1476, when, according to a tradition current in England, Edward IV met with an accident while on a boar hunt and was on the point of being ripped by a boar when Crosborough rushed up in time to save the king who exclaimed "Thou art a veritable henchman." A HENCHMAN coat of arms was granted to Edward HENCHMAN in 1549.

The HENCHMAN family has never been a numerous one in England or America, but its representatives have proved themselves useful citizens. There were in early colonial days several of the name in Massachusetts, but their relationships, if any, to each other have not been discovered. Among them were: Daniel HENCHMAN, the founder of Worcester, Mass., and immigrant ancestor of the HENCHMAN family of Jaffrey. (Forward.) Thomas HENCHMAN of Concord and Chelmsford, Mass., 1654; who was a useful and trusted citizen, much employed in making treaties and negotiating land deals with the Indians. Edmund HENCHMAN of Marshfield, Mass., 1652. Joseph HENCHMAN of Scituate, Mass., 1680. William HENCHMAN of Boston, 1653.

Capt. DANIEL¹ HENCHMAN was b. in England sometime before 1630; came to Massachusetts about 1660, with his wife Sarah, and at least three children. He settled in Boston where on March 12, 1666, he was engaged as a schoolmaster "to assist Mr. Woodmansey in the Grammar School and teach children to write." He continued as schoolmaster until 1671. With Capt. Daniel Gookin, who was Major General in Massachusetts from 1681 until the arrival of Sir Edmund Andross in 1686, and Capt. Thomas Prentice and associates, Daniel HENCHMAN was appointed Nov. 7, 1668, on a committee of the General Court to survey Quinsigamond, now the city of Worcester, Mass., where he was a proprietor and one of the original purchasers of land. This plantation was soon after abandoned on account of the Indian Wars. Daniel HENCHMAN was a captain of distinction in

King Philip's War, in which he marched at the head of his company to Mount Hope, June 26, 1675, and also saw other service in 1675 and 1676. He was made a freeman May 15, 1672; was a member of the Old South Church, Boston; and a dealer in military goods and real estate. He was a member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Boston. He appears to have been a man of some education and a scholar as he left at his death a good library containing among others, works in Greek and Latin and Mathematics.

He. m. (1) in England, Sarah, surname unknown, by whom he had five children. He m. (2) Apr. 26, 1672, Mary Poole, (dau. of William Poole), who survived him and with sons Richard and Hezekiah had administration of his estate. Capt. HENCHMAN d. Worcester, Mass., Oct. 15, 1685. Children: (1) Richard, b. 1654; d. Feb. 15, 1725; m. Esther Webster; was a schoolmaster at Yarmouth, Cape Cod, Mass. (2) Hezekiah, d. May, 1694; m. Abigail ———, and had four children, of whom Daniel, the eldest, b. 1689, was the enterprising bookseller who caused the first edition in America of the English Bible to be printed with a false title page to evade the right of the King's printer. He willed his property to his son-in-law and daughter, Thomas and Lydia (HENCHMAN) HANCOCK. Lydia, dau. of Daniel, m. Nov. 5, 1730, Thomas HANCOCK. No children. They adopted his nephew John HANCOCK, the statesman and first signer of the Declaration of Independence, and Massachusetts delegate to Continental Congress, 1775. (3) *Nathaniel*, b. 1655. (Forward.) (4) Susanna, b. June 7, 1667. (5) William, b. 1669; d. young. (6) William, b. March 29, 1673. (7) Jane, b. May 25, 1674. (8) Daniel, b. NATHANIEL² HENCHMAN, b. England, 1655; settled in Boston, Mass.; took freeman's oath, May 15, 1690. He was a bookbinder and deacon. He m. Jan. 11, 1693 or '94, Hannah Green. Children: (1) Nathaniel, b. Mar. 31, 1695; d. young. (2) Mary, b. Apr. 13, 1697. (3) *Nathaniel*, b. Nov. 22, 1699/1700. (Forward.)

Rev. NATHANIEL³ HENCHMAN was b. Nov. 22, 1700; graduated at Harvard College, 1717; ordained minister of first parish, Lynn, Mass., December, 1720. He d. Dec. 23, 1761, having preached forty-one years. His learning was extensive and his integrity and virtue entitled him to high respect, although he lost the support of some of his people because of his opposition to lectures and evening meetings and his refusal to admit itinerant preachers into his pulpit, among them the Rev. George Whitefield in 1745, the famous missionary of Methodism from England and a founder of Calvinistic Methodism. Rev. Nathaniel HENCHMAN m. (1) Jan. 3, 1727, Deborah Wager or Waker. She d. 1730. DANIEL⁴ HENCHMAN, b. Lynn, Mass., Nov. 23, 1730; m. in old North Church, Boston, March 20, 1753, Elizabeth Hurd, b. Boston, March 16, 1731, dau. of Jacob and Elizabeth (Mason) Hurd. He d. Jan. 7, 1775. Fourteen children, four of whom attained majority: (1) Nathaniel Hurd, b. Sept. 20, 1756. (2) *Jacob*, b. Feb. 7, 1761. (Forward.) (3) Elizabeth Hurd, b. June 15, 1764; d. 1825. 1. RUSSEL BUNCE⁷ HENCHMAN (Daniel⁶, Jacob⁵, Daniel⁴, Nathaniel³, Nathaniel², Daniel¹) was b. Boston, Mass., June 15, 1834, the youngest child of Daniel and Susan (Bunce) Henchman. He m. Boston, Mass., Jan. 11, 1860, Eliza L. Carret, b. Roxbury, Mass., May 29, 1837, dau. of Joseph and Eliza (Tidd) Carret, above named. Soon after his marriage he settled in Cincinnati, Ohio, whence in 1869 he came to Worcester, Mass., where he kept a store until 1878 when he removed to Boston after his father's death to carry on the latter's drug business. In 1887 the family moved again, this time to St. Paul, Minn., and thence in the fall of 1889 to Jaffrey. In 1890 he bought the so-called Robert Harkness farm, now (1930) owned by his heirs. She d. He was a useful citizen, interested in public affairs and served the town on various committees, as auditor of town accounts, supervisor of the check lists, and on the board of selectmen for seven years, 1899, 1900, and 1901, and from 1914 to 1917 inclusive. In 1918 he was appointed postmaster of the United States Post Office in East Jaffrey Village, in which capacity he continued to serve until his death. He was a member of the Grange for many years, and of Charity Lodge of Masons. He m. Jaffrey, Sept. 25, 1895, M. Isabel Hodge, b. Jaffrey, Aug. 7, 1872, dau. of Harlan F. and Mary C. (Streeter) Hodge, q. v. She d. Jaffrey, Sept. 3, 1915. Russel B. Henschman d. Jaffrey, Aug. 11, 1931. Children:

HENDERSON

1. JOHN HENDERSON of Lancaster, Mass., who m. Aug. 4, 1749, Jane Turner of Lunenburg, Mass., is supposed to be the John Henderson who was one of the earliest settlers of Jaffrey. He d. before Dec. 5, 1766, when Reuben Kidder of New Ipswich was appointed "administrator of the estate of John Henderson, late of Monadnock No. 2, deceased intestate." The report of Grout and Gilmore in 1768 shows that "the widow Henderson," a settler on the 60th draught, which consisted of lots 7 and 8 in range 8, the Baker farm near the present Underwood farm, and lot 17 in range 3, now the farm of Martin P. Garfield. It is supposed that actual settlement was on the last named lot. Children of John and Jane Henderson:

(2) John Henderson, Jr., was witness to a deed given by Henry Coffeen, of a mountain lot (lot 2, range 4), May 17, 1773. He owned lot 4, range 5, on the south end of Monadnock, 100 acres except twenty acres in the southeast corner, where the home buildings owned by Mrs. Georgia W. Yeatman now stand. In 1784 John Henderson, Jr., of Rindge, sold this property to Samuel Stickney, Jr., for 200 pounds. His house as described in a highway transcript of the town was precariously situated "at the end of the road that leads to the meeting-house." For a more particular description adapted to present day understanding we may say that it was near the height of land on the Mountain road in or near the triangular lot formed by the two branch roads leading to the gate opening into the private way to the present Halfway House on Monadnock. In 1776 John Henderson was elected field driver. He served in the Revolution. (See record in Vol. I.)

HENDERSON (JAMES)

1. JAMES HENDERSON, b. 1769, removed from Boston to Westford, Mass., in 1804. In September, 1805, he bought of Samuel Buss a lot of land on the Turnpike road west of the place at present known as Maple Lawn Villa, where he built a two-story house and store. In 1818, after the death of his wife, he leased the place to William Ainsworth who seems to have made it his home, and removed to East Jaffrey. (See Stores, Vol. I.) In 1833 Henderson sold the store and removed to Boston. The buildings were burned Nov. 3, 1871, at which time they were unoccupied but owned by Asa Chamberlain. He m.
